

**GILLETT DEFIES THE
BOSSES; WON'T DROP
BEER FIGHT**

Then upon a programme, send a committee to Speaker Sweet to outline their views, and then prepare to put them through. Just what they will decide is not certain, except that they will not stand for any delay through a referendum.

Col. Gillett declares emphatically that the former service men will not tolerate any "camouflage programme."

"The proposal for a referendum would merely postpone a light wine and beer law for another year," said Col. Gillett. "It would amount to an unnecessary passing of the buck to the people. We know the voters want a liberal bill put through at this session and we propose to respond to their wishes. We intend to see to it, also, that there is a thorough-going inquiry into the Anti-Saloon League." **PUT PROMPT VETO UPON REFERENDUM PLAN.**

The purpose of the soldier-Assemblymen to vote as a unit against a referendum and defeat pseudo-enforcement bills, prompted Speaker Sweet to announce that the leaders felt the proposal to refer Prohibition enforcement to the people should not be adopted.

"After Monday night's meeting of the ex-service men," said Assemblyman McLoughlin (Dem., Kings), "I feel sure the legislative leaders will entertain no illusions as to where we stand. We want a light wine and beer bill and will fight for one. And we are for a real investigation of the Anti-Saloon League."

What part Col. Theodore Roosevelt will take in the deliberations of the ex-soldiers remains to be seen. Roosevelt has refrained from taking sides on the wet and dry issue except that when the Cuvillier resolution to investigate the Anti-Saloon League was considered he first voted

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
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
