associations or recognized distributors. The Governor arranged to have Adjutant General Charles W. Berry come to New York and discuss the offer with Mayor Hylan. The War Department will not make deliveries, but purchasers are expected to use their own trucks.

Col. James Regan, army supply officer, was taking orders this morning at Eighth Avenue and 24th Street. He said that several days ago speculators had tried to get the army meat at almost any price.

Mr. Rose's investigation indicated that the city is well supplied with canned goods, but short on flour.

New York's supply of fresh meat, which was threatened for a time by the railroad strike, is being replenished to-day by the arrival of livestock from the West.

About 2,000 head of cattle for Wilson & Co. are at Camp Dix, N. J., and plans are under way to get them into New York by rail and lighter.

Sixty cars of livestock already at tidewater are expected to be delivered in New York and Jersey to-night.

The Mercantile Exchange announced to-day that it had suspended trading in butter and eggs on Monday and will not resume until the strike is over.

To-day's receipts of butter in New York amounted to 1,100 tubs, which came by express. Only 500 tubs came in yesterday and 500 on Monday, against normal receipts of from 6,000 to 11,000 tubs.

FEDERAL OFFICIAL WANTS SET PRICES TO BALK GOUGERS

The profiteering in foods received

a body blow this morning when Armin W. Riley, U. S. Department of Justice, placed a maximum price on live poultry to put an end to the gouging of consumers that was made possible by the abnormal traffic conditions resulting from the present tie-up.

Last Monday The Evening World called the attention of the Government to the fact that the war regulations were still on the statute books, and that if applied to profiteers the present inflated prices would soon come down. The Evening World's expose of the unheard-of prices on live poultry in its issue of yesterday reflected the conditions in the live poultry market, where fowls sold at 60 cents per pound wholesale, and some buyers would not even hesitate to pay a considerably higher price in order to secure a larger allotment.

Taking the information offered in The Evening World, by its food expert, the following telegram was sent to the President of the live poultry receivers' organization:

April 12, 1920.  
"George G. Brown, President Wholesale Live Poultry Receivers' Association, Was Washington Market, New York."

"Due to the present abnormal conditions and in order to conserve food as far as possible and protect the consuming public from paying extortionate prices, I would suggest that your association determine on a maximum price of 50 cents per pound for live fowls and 30 cents per pound on roosters. It should be thoroughly understood that no bonus or premium should be paid, either directly or indirectly, in addition to the original purchase price. In such cases where poultry has been brought here direct purchase the receiver should not charge more than 5 per cent above the cost of the poultry laid down in the wholesale market."

"ARMIN W. RILEY, Bureau of Investigation, Department of Justice."

A margin of profit of 5 cents per pound over the wholesale cost will be the maximum allowed to the distributing markets, which may not be increased by more than 7 cents by the retail butchers when sold direct to consumers.




