

TOMPSON LIQUOR DRINKING CHARGE IN SENATE TO-NIGHT

Resolution to Expunge His Remarks From Record Will Be Introduced.

Special Dispatch From a Staff Correspondent. ALBANY, April 19.—The attack made upon Senator George F. Tompson, upon the Assembly and in charges that whiskey was used during the taking of the vote upon the ousting of the five Socialists, will come up to-night in the Senate, when a resolution will be introduced to expunge his remarks from the record. Much mystery is being made of the outcome of that resolution, and there is considerable speculation as to the stand that will be taken by the Senate from Niagara.

There is also much speculation as to what is going to happen in the Assembly to-night when the report of the Judiciary Committee to the effect that it is not in the committee's province to investigate the Anti-Saloon League, and that if such an investigation be made it should be made by a legislative committee of both houses, and an appropriation of \$35,000 be made for the same.

Assembly Republican leaders fear that a determined effort will be made to-night to pass a resolution to this effect in view of the latest Anderson onslaught. Assemblyman Louis Cuddeker will introduce such a resolution.

Mr. Anderson says that he does not intend to wait upon District Attorney Timothy E. Roland of Albany County to go to the charges that there was a violation of the Prohibition Law on the night of the Socialist ouster. Mr. Roland has not applied to the State as received from Anderson, calling his attention to the charges and does not intend doing so. What, if any, action he will take he has not indicated.

Mr. Anderson has intimated that if Mr. Roland does not act he will turn

the matter over to the Federal authorities. "We are not accustomed to let matters drop," said Mr. Anderson. "If the District Attorney of Albany County does not elect to take any action, we will try some other way. We will arouse and crystallize public sentiment to the point where some action must be taken by some one. If a law has been violated it is the duty of some one to punish the violator."

The arrival of Algeon Lee, former Socialist Alderman of New York City, and one of the Socialist big game, has been the cause of some more worry to the party leaders. Mr. Lee made his appearance this morning while he did not state the object of his visit at this time, it is generally supposed that he came for the purpose of being present at the Thompson matter in the Senate to-night, to gather material for Socialist propaganda.

BREAKERS AHEAD FOR HUDSON TUNNEL

Jersey Governor, Opposed to Direct Tax, May Veto Bill if It Is Not Amended.

TRENTON, N. J., April 19.—An attempt may be made to pass the bill of House Majority Leader Hershfield of Passaic allowing an extension of one year before the law of 1918 for the sale of properties for delinquent taxes after July 1 becomes effective before the Legislature adjourns sine die next week.

If the postponement is not authorized it is said that many persons will lose their homes. The present serious housing situation may bring an appeal to Governor Edwards for a special message to the Senate Wednesday, asking for the passage of the Hershfield bill, which has passed the House.

When the Legislature reconvenes on Wednesday the Hudson vehicular tunnel project may experience trouble. As the Bridge and Tunnel bill will not stand the voters shall, at the next November election, vote on a bond issue of \$22,000,000 for New Jersey's share in these projects and also on the question of a direct State


