

CATHOLIC PRIEST CALLS PROHIBITION A DENIAL OF RIGHTS

At Same Time Paulist Lecturer Says Church Commands Law Obedience.

"Prohibition may be defined as a denial and suppression of a normal man's right to use alcoholic beverages," said the Very Rev. Thomas F. Burke of the Paulist Fathers, in opening his lecture in the Church of St. Paul the Apostle, Columbus Avenue and 60th Street, before a packed audience last night.

The subject of the lecture, one of a series which the Paulists have been giving for non-Catholics, under the auspices of the Knights of Columbus, was entitled "The Catholic Church and Prohibition."

Father Burke denied that the church regards prohibition as a means toward that social regeneration for which, he asserted, all Christians are working, and he asserted that the extreme theories urged by some advocates of prohibition, which would ban drink as an evil in itself and forbid its use for sacramental purposes, are "contrary both to Catholic philosophy and theology."

As a law of the land, however, the speaker insisted that every Catholic must obey.

"Never was there a more unjust, invidious lie, and one which required prompter nulling than that recently spread broadcast by some people that the church advocates disobedience to this or any other of the nation's laws," went on the priest.


