

**Plan Fig Leaf
Garb If Overall
Men Profiteer**

Cedar Grove Takes Up Suggestion, But Soapy Can't See Where It's New Idea.

CEDAR GROVE, N. J., April 20.
At a meeting of the Cedar Grove Board of Poultry Trade held here last night it was voted to employ Frank McDermitt of Newark as attorney to revise the by-laws of the board so that it may take up the overall, lunch box and profiteering problems which confront the country to-day.

The action was taken after the board had received a letter from a Brooklyn man asking if fig trees could be raised in this locality. It is assumed that the writer of the letter had in mind the wearing of fig leaves in case the overall people decide to turn profiteers. Here was a new idea.

Wallie Dobbs moved that the question of wearing fig leaves instead of overall be referred to the Committee on New Business, but Soapy Clock-worshiper arose and said:

"New business, hell! Wearin' leaves is as old as creation."
It was agreed finally that the question be referred to the finance committee, with power to employ Mr. McDermitt.

The lunch box proposition brought forth a heated discussion, because El Parkins, in advocating the motion to compel hired men to take their lunches into the fields would save wear and tear on dinner bells, shoes and so forth.

Hugo Peebles said the wear and tear on dinner bells would not amount to "chicken" in a thousand years. He advocated having the hired men go barefooted to save shoe leather.

The real estate committee decided to raise the rent on chicken houses 25 per cent, until the moulting season when it will be reduced to 20 per cent, as the hens take a vacation during that season.

April 27 was declared a holiday as it is election day.

"After a letter has voted his preference for the next President, he needs a rest," explained Wallie Dobbs, "special in these tryin' times."

A motion to adjourn was moved and seconded.

ROSES FOR PARK AVENUE.

Planned to Make Centre of Street a Long Garden.

Park Commissioner Gallatin has announced to the Fifth Avenue Association a plan to make the middle part of Park Avenue, over the New York Central tracks, a garden of roses. He appealed to members of the association, especially those interested in the apartment houses, to help prevent nurse maids, children and dogs from destroying the shrubbery.

The Commissioner also said the eastern edge of Central Park is to be restored to a presentable appearance by repairing the damage done by many parades.

The association discussed a plan to make 45th Street a one-way street between Fifth and Park Avenues.






