

N. Y. U. SURPRISES ITS CHAIRMAN WITH HONORARY DEGREE

Confers It Upon Vice Chancellor Stevenson and Seven Others—Address by Burton.

The commencement exercises to-day at New York University afforded one surprise which was not on the programme. This was the conferring of the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws upon Eugene Stevenson, a Vice Chancellor of New Jersey and Chairman of the Committee on Honorary Degrees. The decision to confer this award was made by the committee in the absence of Mr. Stevenson and was unknown to him.

Seven other honorary degrees were conferred—that of Doctor of Commercial Science upon Monsieur J. M. M. Casanova, French High Commissioner stationed in this city, and Charles Pies of Chicago; Doctor of Laws upon Dr. William M. Collier, President of George Washington University, William H. Nichols, President of the General Chemical Company, and Supreme Court Justice M. Warley Pitt-

sek; Doctor of Divinity upon the Rev. Frank Maxwell Townley of Brooklyn, and Doctor of Letters upon Miss Mary Pollock Sherwood of Wellesley College. To the students of the university 85 degrees were awarded. The Commencement Day address was delivered by former Senator Thomas E. Burton of Ohio. After the exercises Chancellor Elmer E. Brown gave a luncheon to the faculty and recipients of honorary degrees. There will be two annual dinners to-night, the Washington Square branch of the university at the Waldorf-Astoria, and the School of Commerce at the Astor.

15 HURT ON TRAIN BLOWN FROM TRACK

Four Cars Wrecked by Wind on Northern Pacific Road in Minnesota.

BRACKENRIDGE, Minn., June 9.—Fifteen persons were injured, seven seriously, when four coaches of a Northern Pacific passenger train were blown from the track last night near Foxholme. A score of others received minor hurts. A. A. Carlstrom of Gwinne, N. D., former State Auditor of North Dakota, was perhaps mortally injured. His daughter also was seriously hurt.

Reports from Wagoner said "Foxholme, a small town, had been 'wiped out.' No fatalities were reported, but doctors and nurses were asked for to care for the injured. At Gardner, N. D., several cars of a Great Northern freight train were swept from the track and two members of the crew were injured, telegraph reports said.

HUNGARIAN JEWS DIE IN NEW RIOTS

French Foreign Office Hears of Many Killed in Budapest Pogrom.

PARIS, June 9.—According to information received at the Foreign Office anti-Semitic outbreaks occurred in Budapest around June 4, on which date the advices stated that one man saw twelve Jews killed. The rioting continued for several days, during which many Jews were killed, the Foreign Office despatches said.
