

Mother Tries To Sell Baby Girl at \$250

Widow Hopes to Regain Health With Money and Support Boy of Five.

Who wants one of the finest little Irish girls in the world? Here is the chance. For \$250 you may have Margaret McNulty, two and a half years old. The money is to enable her mother, Katherine McNulty, to regain her health.

Margaret's father died three years ago. She has a brother, Martin, named for his father, who is five. The parents came over from Ireland several years ago.

The mother, pretty, dark-haired and twenty-nine years old, has supported the children since her husband's death but a year ago last March she was attacked with influenza, which developed tuberculosis. She since has been unable to work, and has been dependent upon friends. Her physician said she needed fresh air, and that alone would cure her. She could not be cured and take care of the children too. Martin was the oldest and the least trouble, and she thought she knew of people who would take care of him, but not the girl.

And Margaret is lovely! With cute green ties in her curly, fair hair, she played about the room with her brother while her mother told the story of her efforts to keep health and home too. How hard she had tried was apparent. She had moved three months ago into the tiny rear flat, up two flights of stairs, at No. 2362 Second Avenue, and every corner of the room was bright and clean. The other number is a mail address. The children were tidily dressed and looked newly provided.

HERRICK HONORED IN PARIS.

Made Honorary Citizen—Many Notables Attend Ceremony.

PARIS, July 25.—Myron T. Herrick, on a special mission here from the United States, was made a citizen of Paris to-day by M. Auzanet, Municipal Prefect, in the presence of a number of prominent personages at the Hotel de Ville.

Among those attending the ceremony were President Poincare, the Prince of Monaco, Premier Millerand, several high French military men and state and city officials. The Municipal Building was decorated with the tricolor and the Stars and Stripes.

A chorus from the Paris Opera House sang several selections, and the Republican Guards band played the Marseillaise and the Star Spangled Banner.

Boy Burglar is Not a Boy Scout.

William Adams, fifteen years old, known as "the Boy Scout burglar," because he wore a Boy Scout uniform, was sent to the Children's Village at Chaucey, N. Y., to-day by Justice Wilkin in the Children's Court in Brooklyn, as a juvenile delinquent. On July 7 the boy who lives at No. 27 Jefferson Street, Brooklyn, forced an entrance into the house of Charles Silver, at No. 18 Monteth Street, Brooklyn, and stole \$50 worth of clothing. The Boy Scout organization said the boy had never been a member of the Boy Scouts.

LOOK FOR A FAGIN IN AUTO THEFTS

Boys Tipped for "Minding" Machines Believed by Police to Be Confederates of Thieves.

Police officials to-day expressed belief that some Fagin is directing an organized band of automobile thieves, following the arrest of four boys this morning at the Brooklyn end of the Manhattan Bridge in an automobile owned by John Brennan of No. 1921 Ocean Avenue, Brooklyn, which Brennan reported stolen last night in front of the Hotel Pennsylvania.

The boys arrested were Harry Kay, No. 232 West 22nd Street, William Pearson, No. 142 West 10th Street; Joseph Gavin, No. 301 West 30th Street, and Gerard Passano, No. 272 West 36th Street. The latter two were sent to the Children's Society, charged with juvenile delinquency, and the two older boys were arraigned in the Adams Street Court, Brooklyn, charged with grand larceny.


SAVED FROM BURNING BOAT.

Tug Rushed to Aid of Burning Craft off Norton's Point.

A power boat such as fishermen use off Coney Island caught fire this morning off Norton's Point just as the steamer Monmouth, on her way to the city from the Highlands of the Neversink, got aboard of her. The Monmouth was immediately swung about to go to the rescue as the entire stern of the power boat was ablaze.

But the tug Roger C. Sullivan, with a string of barges in tow, also saw the fire and being nearer, cast off her barge and ran alongside the power boat. The men aboard the latter had put her nose into the wind, which prevented the flames from reaching her bow where they took refuge. In a short time the tug had rescued these men and put out the fire with a hose line after which the power boat was towed ashore.
