Few Belgians Attending Antwerp Olympic Meet

Government Disappointed at Attendance, Anglo-Saxons Composing Most of Crowd.

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TILDEN-GARLAND TEAM ADVANCES TO SEMI-FINALS

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 19.—William T. Tilden and Charles Garland, the Davis Cup players edged their way into the semi-final round of the national doubles championships at Chestnut Hill.

Tilden again was all brilliancy, but varied his speed with some soft stroke placing and accurate cross-court driving that rounded out his play to a degree quite unlooked for by many of those present.

Garland displayed a steady plugging game, rarely making errors and playing brilliantly when Tilden was easing off a little.

In the first set Tilden won two love games on his service and Garland took one. Their opponents won the first and third games, but in the last five of the set the veterans scored only four points, only 200 of them on a placement.

In the second set Tilden and Garland broke in at once on Voshell's service and also took the final, but this was the second game lost in the set. Alexander won the next game after dupe with two service aces, but the next went to Tilden and Garland, who earned 15 points on placements.

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
