

### COX FOR FEDERAL AID IN ALL LINES OF EDUCATION

National Policy Should Be to Extend Its Advantages, He Declares.

Gov. Cox's views favoring the entering of education by the Federal Government, as imparted to the National Educational Association, were given out here to-day by George H. Strayer of Teachers College, Chairman of the association's legislative committee. Gov. Cox wrote:

"I am giving serious attention to the necessary reorganization of the executive department of the Federal Government. I shall certainly favor the effective administration of affairs relating directly to all matters of human welfare including education. It should be the province of the Federal Government to extend aid in all lines of education, looking particularly to the removal of illiteracy, Americanization of immigrants, preparation and proper compensation of teachers, physical education, health and sanitation and equalizing of educational opportunity to the end that every boy and girl in the United States shall be guaranteed a chance of obtaining a complete and practical education.

"We should extend the advantages of education by a national policy without destroying the effectiveness of local provision, maintaining that democracy in education which will develop healthy and reasonable individualism in American national life, which enables the citizens of this Republic to think for themselves and therefore find for themselves the solution of their problems."

**Broussard Wins in Louisiana.**  
NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 16.—Edwin A. Broussard, brother of the late Senator Robert Broussard, was leading Representative Jared Sanders by more than 4,900 votes for the senatorial nomination in returns completed to-day from Tuesday's primary. Returns on New Orleans, complete, and about half of the State, gave the vote as follows: Broussard, 28,472; Sanders, 22,333; Denison Caffery, 1,427.

**Stable and Five Aves Burned.**  
The big stable of the Kleenewriter Ink and Coal plant on the Patterson plank road, at Homestead, N. J., near Union Hill, was burned early to-day. Three large automobile trucks and two touring cars were destroyed. The stable was near the stables of Jazole & Bellis, destroyed by fire a few months ago. The origin of the fire to-day is unknown.
