

POLICE SEND OUT ALARM FOR CHURCH OFFICER AND GIRL

Warrior Charging Embezzlement Issued for Missing Treasurer.

Circulars bearing the picture of Shubel K. Siver, treasurer of the First Reformed Church of New Brunswick, and Miss Adelle Gouin, the pretty eighteen-year-old waitress of Perth Amboy, who disappeared last Wednesday at the same time that \$5,200 worth of the church's Liberty Bonds disappeared, from a safe deposit box, were sent out today by Public Prosecutor Joseph E. Stricker. A warrant for the arrest of Siver on the charge of embezzlement has been issued.

Various reports have been received by the New Brunswick police as to the movements of Siver and the girl. One was that they had been seen in a motor car on their way to Staten Island; another that they had gone together to Connecticut or Canada. For some reason not yet disclosed, the police said they expected the pair to return to New Brunswick within twenty-four hours, but later, as if to disprove this, the descriptive circular was issued from the prosecutor's office.

The abandoned wife of the former church treasurer fears that Siver may attempt to marry Miss Gouin, as City Clerk Arthur Graham of Perth Amboy said she had telephoned him to refuse to grant a license in case application for one should be made.

It was learned that two days after

the disappearance—a fact then known only to his family—Siver sought for a license to marry the waitress.

In Perth Amboy yesterday the police said Siver first met Miss Gouin when she was a waitress in a lunchroom. He then was manager of a chain of stores. The girl left her mother several months ago, and lived in a furnished room from a Mrs. Marguerite Knudson.

Mrs. Knudson says Siver visited the waitress twice a week on the average and brought her gifts. Once, Mrs. Knudson said, Mrs. Siver pleaded with the girl to relinquish the church Treasurer.

HARDING REVIEWS 5,000 SHRINERS

Many New Yorkers in Washington for Convention of Masonic Clubs.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—More than 5,000 members of the Mystic Shrine, attending the thirteenth annual convention of the National League of Masonic Clubs, passed in review before President and Mrs. Harding at the 17th Street White House gate yesterday afternoon. In the evening, at the coronation session of Alma Temple at Poll's Theatre, the President was given a rousing ovation after a ten-minute speech.

More than 200 New York City police and firemen, members of the Masonic Square Club, arrived to-day. More than 15,000 delegates, representing every State in the Union, take part in the parade to-day, and the outdoor festivities arranged by the 200 Masonic lodges of Washington. There will be a pilgrimage to Mount Vernon. The convention will end with a banquet at the Hotel Willard Thursday night.

MILLER ATTACKED FOR SIGNING BILL

Said to Disregard Protests of Civic Organizations to Sale of Mohawk Lake Reservation.

Despite the protests of the New York Chamber of Commerce, the Merchants' Association and other civic and welfare organizations against the Hawley bill which proposed that the State sell the Mohawk Lake Reservation in Westchester County, it was learned today that Gov. Miller signed the bill three weeks ago. This reservation includes part of the Croton Watershed, from which New York gets its drinking water. Had the bill been defeated the state was planning to reforest the tract.

Miller to abandon the Mohawk reservation—the 1,000-acre tract retained to protect the drinking water of the citizens of New York City from pollution," said Edward Hatch Jr., chairman of the Pollution Committee of the Merchants' Association, to-day, "is a distinct menace to the health of New York."

"Gov. Miller has disregarded the petitions sent to him by civic organizations and insurance companies. The bill was introduced in the last days of the session and was pushed through before a hearing could be requested. It is purely a political ploy to benefit the politicians of Westchester County."
