

# ANOTHER WOUNDED "SLACKER" FOUND; GASED AT MARNE

Arthur Engels, Months in Hospital, on Board List, Given Out.

Further investigation of the War Department's "slacker" lists resulted today in adding two more names to those cleared of the charge, making a total of 29 thus far out of 154 listed, including to-day's list.

Arthur Engels, thirty-five, of No. 416 East 156th Street, Bronx, reported by Local Board No. 10, to-day furnished an Evening World investigator with his war record. He is now living at No. 656 Bergen Avenue, Bronx, and is a chauffeur.

Engels enlisted Jan. 1, 1918, at Fort Slocum and soon went overseas with the 105th Ammunition Train. He was gassed and wounded in the left arm and leg at the Battle of the Marne and was in a hospital until January, 1919, in which month he was honorably discharged. On April 26, 1919, he was paid the \$50 Government bonus, showing, he said, that the Government had a record of his service.

Morris Rosenkrantz, twenty-four, of No. 3758 Third Avenue, was inducted to-day when he saw his name included in a "slacker" list. He said he grew impatient while waiting to be drafted and enlisted in the navy at the Brooklyn Navy Yard July 17, 1918. His papers showed he was honorably discharged in May, 1919. He said he crossed the ocean seven times on the U. S. steamship Princess Matoika as a first class cook.

The War Department yesterday struck from its list of "deserters" the names of Thomas C. McDonald, of No. 109 East 87th Street, who served honorably in the navy throughout the war.

The janitor at No. 488 Claremont Parkway, Bronx, said that Jacob Scherff left after registering for the draft, saying he was going to Japan. Abraham Morgenstern, of No. 463 Claremont Parkway, also was said to have moved after registering for the draft.

The following Bronx men were not known at the addresses given in to-

day's list: Paul Monahan, Nathan Blin, Meyer Steinman, Morris Sternberg, Joseph Gedalya, David Finegold, Nathan Dechtian and Irving Frindlock.

Dave Goodwin, of No. 20 Menahan Street, Brooklyn, was said by neighbors to have moved four years ago. The janitress of the building said she believed he served with the British Army.

Fred C. Angulin moved from No. 146 Menahan Street about four years ago and was believed to have gone to England.

Egon Heimermann, thirty-two, of No. 269 Bleecker Street, Brooklyn, said he was in Switzerland when America entered the war and registered for military service with the American Consul at Bale. He joined the American Red Cross in Switzerland and served therein until two months after the armistice was signed.

George Peifer, No. 410 Harman Street, Brooklyn, has been in the Kings Park Hospital for the Insane for six years, his parents said to-day.

Vito Sacco, William Schaefer and Charles Schirmppe were not known at the addresses given in the list.


