

SAYS \$45,000 EACH IS SPENT TO TRAIN DISABLED SOLDIERS

Kansas Congressman Charges Huge Waste of Funds in Rehabilitation Work.

MILLIONS IN SALARIES.

Robinson Declares Total Cost Now Threatens to Be \$1,000,000,000.

WASHINGTON, June 8 (United Press).—Charges that Federal funds are being wasted in "shovelful" by the Federal Board for Vocational Education rehabilitating soldiers were made to-day by Representative Robinson (Rep., Kan.).

If the present policy is continued the Government could give every disabled soldier \$10,000 in cash, and more soldiers would get the money than will be rehabilitated by the present board, he said. Under present practices the rehabilitations bill will exceed \$1,000,000,000, Mr. Robinson added, stating that already \$245,000,000 has been appropriated. He favored aiding the disabled men, but insisted that although \$145,000,000 already had been actually expended, only 8,000 men have rehabilitated—a cost of \$45,000 a man.

Overhead expenses of the board are extremely high, he charged in claiming that in April, 1921, the board paid \$8,000,000 to the wounded men and \$3,000,000 in salaries.

Mr. Robinson charges that the board is allowing "mushroom" schools to be organized overnight for the training of men, that large sums are being given to their promoters instead of sending the wounded to State universities and established schools.

He continued:

"If you think that money has not been thrown out by the shovelful, I want to cite some cases. Over in Pittsburgh a man got a contract from the board to start a school for the disabled. He had no buildings and no equipment, but the board agreed to give him 150 students and pay him \$25 a month tuition per man. He had 100 men in his school and was receiving \$15,000 a month. At that time we had about 200 men in training, but this school teacher in Pittsburgh, with no school at all when he made the contract, had more students than any great university in America."

Mr. Robinson then pointed out that Kentucky University and Berea College accepted disabled men for tuition rates of \$5 and \$3.50 a month.

"I have found," he continued, "that a certain tailoring company in New York had assigned to it thirty disabled soldiers and was paid for its so-called instruction \$1,000 a month,

when the boys were doing ordinary work and receiving no instruction. These things are going on all over the country. The soldiers are not getting what they ought to have out of these millions appropriated by Congress."

U. S. RESTS CASE AT CHEW'S TRIAL

The prosecution in the trial of Capt. Beverly Grayson Chew, charged with forgery and other offenses, seated to-day. The court martial, sitting at Governor's Island was delayed in opening because of the absence of two witnesses who were expected to testify to a photograph of Mrs. Marjorie B. Chew, wife of the defendant, and to the circumstances surrounding the issue of alleged forged checks. The defense, however, suddenly ad-

mitted for the first time that the photograph in question was a photograph of Mrs. Chew. The defense also admitted that checks carrying the forged signatures of Captains Fred B. Jafferty,

Harold D. Spaulding and William L. Redfield were not authorized by those parties. It was also admitted that the names of Capt. Chew in alleged registrations at hotels was un-

authorized. After the prosecution had announced the close of its case, William E. Leahy, counsel for Capt. Chew, asked for an indefinite recess.


