

# SEIZE PLAYWRIGHT IN HOTEL AT 1 A. M., TAKE HIM TO JAIL

# TWO MORE WOMEN TO BE NAMED BY MRS. STILLMAN

### Hayden Talbot Goes to Ludlow St. "Club" Over a Matter of \$3,000 Alimony.

### NO. 2 HAS ORDER ALSO.

### Author Taken From Commodore Hopes to Furnish Bail To-Day.

Hayden Talbot, playwright and author, made a change of address this morning between 1 and 2 o'clock. Mr. Talbot was a guest at the Hotel Commodore until that hour. Then after reading an order by Supreme Court Justice Tieney he "checked out" and, escorted by Deputy Sheriff Eisenstein and Detective Harry Osborne, registered at Ludlow Street jail. A call Mr. Talbot had left at the Commodore for 9:30 this morning was transferred to the new address to read S. A. M. The playwright, it appears, owes \$3,000 back alimony, for which his former wife, Mrs. Benedict Bristow Talbot, an actress, obtained an order. Mr. Talbot overlooked paying it, and Justice Tieney signed an order requiring that he be committed for contempt until he had given a bond in that sum.

The Deputy Sheriff and detectives were waiting in the room adjoining Mr. Talbot's this morning when he arrived, and announced they were a reception committee acting for the court to deprive him of the freedom of the city. The playwright explained that he had several important engagements to-day and one in Washington on Friday with a member of the Cabinet, and it would upset his plans very much to have them interfered with. He said, however, he expected no difficulty in obtaining a bond when his friends heard of his arrest for so slight an amount.

As far back as the time when Julius Harburger was Sheriff the playwright was a candidate for membership in the Alimony Club in Ludlow Street Jail. Mrs. Benedict Bristow Talbot, having obtained a divorce with an allowance of \$75 a month. He managed to get \$1,500 in arrears and about that time, 1914, married Miss Norma Mitchell, a stock actress, in San Francisco.

The new marriage brought the first Mrs. Talbot down upon him. Recently Norma Talbot, now in the pictures, obtained a divorce in Los Angeles and an order from the court in that city requiring that Talbot pay her \$150 a month for twenty months.

### Jail Now for Man Who Refused to Wash the Dishes

### Watson, Ordered to Support Family, Didn't Do So and Court Loses Patience.

Magistrate Miller, acting for Magistrate Kochendorfer, while the latter is in camp with his regiment at Peekskill, to-day ordered George Watson of No. 126 Fifth Street, Long Island City, to put up a bond for \$750 to pay his wife \$15 a week or go to the workhouse. Watson was looked up.

"Watson is the former railroad detective who was ordered by Magistrate Kochendorfer to wash the dishes, take his family out once a week and get a job to support them. When he failed to do this the Magistrate ordered him to get a man-sized job in a week. He came in to report to-day.

"How many places have you visited to get a job?" asked Magistrate Miller.

"Three," said Watson, passing up a paper.

"I see you visited one place June 2 and two places June 3. Why didn't you visit more?"

"They were the only places I saw that looked like a chance," said Watson.

"Why didn't you take that job as a porter offered to you? I know about that," questioned the court.

"Oh, I didn't hear about that," answered Watson.

"There is a job out on a farm I have for you, \$30 a day and your board. Do you want that?" asked the Magistrate.

Watson looked up at the ceiling and then down, twirling his hat.

"I am convinced," said the court, "you don't want to work and support your family."

Watson was led away and Mrs. Watson left court with her children saying she would try and get a job herself this afternoon to hold the family together.

It was "Helen," who was stated definitely to-day, who aroused the jealousy of Florence Leeds one time on Mr. Stillman's yacht.

Mrs. Stillman's lawyers have proof that she was on board the Modesty one time in the fall of 1920. This was when Mr. Stillman's yacht was close by in New York waters.

# CROKER RAISED HIS SON AS HELP IN OLD AGE, HE TESTIFIES

### Always Trusted Him Implicitly but Calls Testimony "Positively Untrue."

Richard Croker took the witness stand to-day in the City Court before Justice Meyers and a jury in the suit brought by his son to regain the equivalent of forty-nine shares of Wabash Railroad stock which Richard Jr. says he gave his father by mistake. The father denied vehemently that he at any time knew his son had given him more than he was entitled to.

Mr. Croker said he would be eighty years old Nov. 23. In scanning papers that were handed to him by his attorney, Harold Nathan, the witness did so without the aid of glasses.

"No, I told him to buy for me. I trusted everything he did for me."

"Was your son attending to your affairs in this country at that time?"

"Yes; he had the power of attorney."

"When shown documents in the stock transaction Mr. Croker said he could not recall if he had received them, and added:

"I never took the trouble of reading them or anything else. I just trusted my son always. I raised him for that purpose, to take care of me in my old age; I thought he would be a great help to me."

The witness said he had a home in Ireland and at Palm Beach, and in December, 1914, when in this city, he had a conversation with his son regarding securities which were in his old age and which were in his son's possession.

"I wrote him a letter from Ireland, asking him for all my affairs, to give me an accounting for what I held that he had taken up to this."

"Your son has testified that on the previous day when you were at his office he handed to you a list of those Wabash stocks containing the certificate numbers and a statement containing all this stock, was that so?"

"Positively untrue."

"Did you have any list or memorandum in regard to this Wabash stock?"

"No list at all."

"I believed too much in him, that was the trouble. If my foresight was equal to my afterthought I would not be here now," testified the witness.

Following the visit to the Guaranty Trust Company, Mr. Croker said, he accompanied his son to the Equitable, where everything I had done in that joint box with the exception of a few bonds I had in Ireland; they were all under his control—everything," testified the witness.

"I gave him the key and said, 'Open the joint box.' He said, 'This key does not open the joint box.' He said, 'I gave the joint box up.' I said that as a funny thing to do, to give up that joint box, where do I come in?"

Here the witness was cautioned by his attorney to "stick to the testimony," whereupon Mr. Croker replied that he wanted to go ahead and explain the joint box episode, but Mr. Nathan would not allow it, so the witness said that he hired another lawyer to go ahead and put what they had in that box. The son, the witness said, was present when that occurred.

Mr. Nathan moved to dismiss the complaint on the grounds that the plaintiff did not prove a cause of action. Justice Meyer said he would reserve his decision until after the defendant had presented his side.

### ZIONISTS REFORM U. S. ORGANIZATION

Choose a Committee to Replace Officers Who Resigned Over Palestine Fund.

CLEVELAND, June 9.—Loyalty and allegiance to the World Zionist Organization and white-headed support to the Keren Hayesod (Palestine Foundation Fund) were pledged by delegates to the American Zionist Organization at the closing session of their convention here.

Resolutions adopted acknowledged the Zionist Congress as the supreme authority in all Zionist affairs, and the American Organization to decisions of the congress and urge that "the controversy over the Keren Hayesod in this country, engaged in by opposing groups within the organization, come to an end."

Officers of electing a President and instead of electing those who resigned with President Julian W. Mack, an Administrative Committee was elected. Its members are Peter J. Schneider, General Treasurer; Louis Lipsky, General Secretary; and Herman Conheim, Abraham Goldberg, Bernhard A. Rosenblat, Morris Rathenau and Louis Robinson, all of New York.
