

FUSIONISTS FIGHT HYLAN WITH FIVE-CENT FARE PLANK

This Administration Is Attacked in Resolutions as "Indecent and Incompetent."

PRICE IS CHAIRMAN.

Declare Mayor's Course Brought Transit Bills That Menace Nickel Fares.

The City Coalition Committee to form a fusion campaign for the defeat of Mayor Hylan for re-election was organized at the Hotel Pennsylvania last night. Joseph M. Price was elected to lead the movement, which he had suggested.

Gustav W. Thompson of Brooklyn roused enthusiasm by offering a resolution which should serve as a platform for the organization, and was marked by an attack on "the indecency and incompetency of the Hylan Administration," charging that the present traction difficulties were due to them. The resolution asserted that the fare rate could and must be kept at 5 cents and must bring to the public far greater service than is now given. The resolution was referred to a sub-committee. Mr. Thompson said in part:

"The Hylan Administration, claims it has kept fares at 5 cents. This is nominally true, but practically speaking, is unqualifiedly false. The people are getting for 5 cents to-day less than half of what they received four years ago, due to the abandonment of transit lines, the abandonment of transfers and the crowded and unsatisfactory conditions of the trolley, elevated and subway cars.

"The incompetence of the Hylan Administration left nothing for Gov. Miller and the Legislature to do but pass these so-called Miller Transit Bills. In strict justice Mayor Hylan is the author of those bills, for, but for his incompetence, they would never have been passed. The Hylan Administration denounces these bills as in conflict with the principle of home rule.

The Mayor is right in this respect, but no man has done more to wreck the principle of home rule than Mayor Hylan himself.
