

MRS. OYSTER SAYS HUSBAND WISHED TO ADOPT HER

Widow Adds That She Had Grown Fond of Man to Whom She Was Married Later.

SYRACUSE, June 15.—"I feel that my husband's mind had been poisoned against me by those who took advantage of his enfeebled state of health and who worked upon him for their own purposes."
So declared Mrs. Cecil Ready Oyster, widow of the late George M. Oyster Jr., wealthy Washington, D. C. horseman, according to Mrs. Blanche Weaver Baxter, of this city, an intimate friend, who visited Mrs. Oyster at Wardman Park Inn, Washington, last Saturday.
Returning yesterday, Mrs. Baxter gave to Syracuse friends of Mrs. Oyster the latter's version of the incidents that culminated in stories that the wealthy horseman was estranged from his Syracuse bride at the time of his sudden death at Atlantic City. Mrs. Oyster, according to Mrs. Baxter, admits that while she cared for her husband, she could not love him as she could have a younger man, and she feels that influence had been brought to bear upon him to prejudice him against her and to make him feel that his marriage had been a foolish mistake, says Mrs. Baxter.
"He wanted to adopt her in the beginning, but her family felt that such a step would be unwise and might subject her to unkind criticism. Then he begged her to marry him. He promised to gratify her every wish. He sent her telegrams and telephone messages—sometimes as many as three or four in a single day.
"But I don't want to marry," she told him. "I know you are good and kind. I am grateful to you for caring for me, but how can I love a man nearly fifty years older than I?"
"If you will only let me love you and take care of you I shall be entirely satisfied, and I won't ask for anything more," she says he told her.
"But after our marriage," Cecil said, "he was so kind and so lovely to me that I grew to be very fond of him."

New York's Lumber Cut in 1920 Valued at \$20,000,000.
WASHINGTON, June 15.—Lumber cut in New York State in 1920 amounted to 413,000,000 feet valued at \$20,000,000, or nearly double the value of the 1918 cut, according to a statement issued today by the United States Forest Service. Lumber sawed increased 25 per cent, compared with two years ago. The increase in value was due primarily to the post-war increase in lumber prices, the officials said.

HID BIG MAIL LOOT TO AID HIS FRIENDS, DECLARES MURPHY

Chicago Labor Leader Denies Planning \$380,000 Robbery, but Police Are Skeptical.

CHICAGO, June 15.—With the arrest of "Big Tim" Murphy, President of the Gas House Workers' Union and former head of the Street Sweepers' Union, the police believe they have solved the theft of \$380,000 in currency and Liberty bonds from mail trucks. The loot was taken by armed men who were masquerading as ball players.
Murphy's arrest followed the discovery of \$112,900 in his father-in-law's home after Ralph Teter, a mail clerk, confessed to participation in the crime. Frank and Joseph Guisenberg are held as the actual robbers and Vincenzo Cosmano, a friend of Murphy, George Hecker or Bradford and Paul Bonfanti are also being detained.
Murphy admits concealing the stolen bonds and money in the trunk, but denies actual participation in the robbery. The police investigation bears out his statement. "Big Tim," a former member of the Illinois Legislature, had this to say of his arrest:
"I took that trunk to help out a couple of friends and now they're singin' like Caruso and tryin' to frame on me. I admit I know that trunk had 'slum' in it. The dicks ain't got anything on me except I told them about the trunk."
Investigators believe that while Murphy and Cosmano were in jail for the "Mossy" Enright murder, Bradford was a prisoner, and told them he knew a mail clerk, Teter, and after all were released Teter told Murphy he knew men in the Post Office who could tip him off as to valuable shipments. On April 6 he heard of the shipment of cash and bonds, told his accomplices and they planned the theft.

WOMAN ENDS LIFE FROM FERRY BOAT

Marine police were grappling in the North River off Liberty street this morning for the body of a woman about fifty years old, dressed in black, who had jumped from the ferry boat Cranford of the Central Railroad of New Jersey.
According to A. J. Brennan of No. 120 Liberty Street, a passenger on the boat, which was bound for Communipaw, the woman went to the stern just after the ferry boat left its slip at Liberty Street, walked back and forth, then leaped overboard.
The boat circled the spot where the woman had disappeared, but no trace of her was found.

SHIMMY IS O. K. FOR PARIS NOW, IF DENATURED

Dancing Masters Bar Shoulder Movements, but Approve the Rest.
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PARIS, June 15.—The shimmy is now respectable; at least official approval of it has been given by the Union of French Dancing Masters.
It is, however, a shimmy somewhat expurgated that the teachers approve. President Neuman of the Dancing Masters' Union pronounced a ban on the shoulder movement, but declared that any graceful movement was permissible below the shoulders.
The dancing masters also approved the Javoo, which, unlike the shimmy, is a French creation, having originated among the apaches of Belleville. More than 200 dancing teachers, women and men, attended the meeting, delegates being present from dancing associations in England, Italy, Belgium, Switzerland and Egypt.

NEGRESS GETS PH. D. AT PENNSYLVANIA

Miss Mossell First Woman of Race to Win This Degree at an American University.
PHILADELPHIA, June 15.—Miss Sadie Mossell, a young negro woman, will receive the degree of doctor of philosophy at the University of Pennsylvania commencement today. She will be the first of her race in America to be honored with that degree. Miss Mossell lives at No. 2998 Diamond Street and her graduation brings to a close a brilliant scholastic career.
She is the daughter of Aaron A. Mossell, the first negro to be graduated from the University law school, and a niece of Dr. N. P. Mossell of the Douglas Hospital, who was the first negro to be admitted to the practice of medicine from the West Philadelphia College. She is a granddaughter of Bishop Benjamin P. Tanner of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

LEADS THE COPS TO HIS HOOCH AND THEY ARREST HIM

Sheasgreen Gets in Bad Trying to Convince Police Office Is His.

James Sheasgreen, fifty, living at the Hotel Belleclairs and having theatrical agency offices at No. 1531 Broadway, was arrested early today on a charge of having hooch in his office, the first arrest of its kind since the dry law went into effect, according to the police.
Policeman Don Egan of the West 47th Street Station saw a light in the office building at Broadway and 45th Street at 4 A. M. and went in to see if burglars were at work. While he and other cops he had called to aid were in the hall, Sheasgreen entered the building, and they asked him to identify himself. The policemen were unwilling to take his word when he said he was Sheasgreen and showed them his name on a third floor door, so he offered to take them inside and show them documentary evidence.
Unlocking the door, he went in and switched on the lights. On a table, according to the police, they spied a

quart bottle of what appeared to be whiskey. Sheasgreen, they say, admitted it was his, but insisted he had a right to have it on his premises. The policemen disagreed, and told him they were sorry, but had to arrest him.

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
