

EX-DRY LAW CHIEF NOW A DEFENDER OF WETS IN COURT

Charles R. O'Connor Has 50-Proof Share of Cases Where Violations Are Charged.

Charles R. O'Connor, who until a few weeks ago was Prohibition Enforcement Officer for the State of New York, has right-about-faced and is now engaged in the remunerative business of defending those accused of violating the State dry law. This came out today when Justice Horst, presiding in the Special Term of the Supreme Court which is handling all cases of alleged violations of the Mullan-Gage Act, gave George Donellan, the lawyer, a day off. Mr. Donellan has been retained by about ninety-nine out of every one hundred defendants in such cases. The District Attorney had to dig up some offenders far down on the calendar who were represented by other counsel to avoid closing up court for the day.

"Hereafter," said Mr. Donellan to the court, "I shall divide the cases with Mr. O'Connor, who has entered into partnership with me. My time is so taken up with liquor cases that I have been forced to abandon all my other practice."

At 50 cents a drink it will take the price of 800 drinks to pay the \$400 fine assessed against Daniel Kiernan, a bartender, at No. 895 Third Avenue, convicted today by a jury before Justice Horst. Kiernan was out on a suspended sentence when arrested for the second offense.

"We don't want the public to believe the courts can be used by liquor dealers as a cloak, or can be trifled with," said Justice Horst. "A man who had been arrested should know better than to return to the same place and take up the same business." Kiernan's attorney said it would be a great hardship for him to have to pay \$400.

"Let him go to jail for 100 days then," said the court.

The fine was paid.

MILLER ORDERS ALBANY SURVEY

Democrat Put in Charge of Plans to Put Government on Business Basis.

ALBANY, June 17.—Further steps to carry out Gov. Miller's promise of better business methods in the State Government have been taken by the new State Board of Estimate and Control.

At the insistence of Gov. Miller at a meeting of the board, Mark Graves, present head of the Income Tax Bureau, has been appointed research director for the board, with full power to map out a plan for administration of any and all departments of the State. Graves is a Democrat.

The board has also closed contracts with the firm of Perrine & Nichols of New York, efficiency experts, to begin a survey of the State departments. Richmond Smith, also of New York, has been engaged to investigate the purchasing plan now in vogue.

The investigations are to be completed within three months, according to the Governor. The survey will be carried on in several departments at once.

MRS. CORVALAN EXPLAINS

Says Husband's Statement in Suit Gives Wrong Impression.

Mrs. Mary A. Corvalan, of No. 535 West 133d Street, is suing her husband, Louis, for a separation and the custody of their infant son. In a recent report of the proceedings it was stated that Corvalan alleged that his wife spent most of her time after their marriage collecting funds for drives and that she had told him she could make more money collecting than he could give her. "The statement of my husband puts me in a false light," Mrs. Corvalan said yesterday. "I have always been able to support myself by my own efforts and the only drive I was ever in was in aid of the Red Cross. The Red Cross sent me to a hospital and cared for me when my baby was born, and in gratitude for their kindness I helped them in their drive for three or four days afterward. I did not receive any commissions or pay for the work and I turned in every penny I collected and got receipts for the full amount."

WHITE WINGS TO MARCH.

Hylan and Leo Will Lead Parade Thursday.

The "White Wings" will parade on Fifth Avenue next Thursday at 4 o'clock from 57th to 16th Street, going downtown. Led by the Mayor and Street Cleaning Commissioner John P. Kee, the welders of the boom and shovel, spick and span in clean white ducks, will be on annual show. They will take along motor carts, trucks, sweepers, sprinklers, snow tractors and dirt wagons.

The street cleaners will be in three regiments, about 1,000 in all. They will march to the hands of the Police, Fire and Street Cleaning Departments. At North Monument Mayor Hylan and Commissioner Leo will review the column. Ex-service members will wear their military decorations.

FIREMEN CAUGHT BY BACK DRAUGHT, FOUR ARE BURNED

Injured When Window Is Opened After Blaze Is Practically Extinguished.

Four firemen were burned, two seriously, in a fire in the Bush Terminal left building, at 29th Street and Second Avenue, Bay Ridge, early today. Three are members of Engine Company No. 228. They are John Mulligan, Patrick O'Neill and Albert Dickson. John Dreeland, chauffeur for Battalion Chief John Cashman, is the other.

The fire started in the mattress factory of the Burton-Dixie Corporation. An electric spark ignited some cotton.

Members of Engine No. 228 had the fire almost out when a window was opened creating a back draught. Mulligan and O'Neill were thrown to the floor and wedged between bales of burning cotton in several inches of water. Dixon, Edward Seary and James Shaughnessy rescued them. Mulligan and O'Neill were burned about the face, arms and back and Dixon about the arms and hands. Dreeland escaped with a few face burns because his clothing was wet. He took the others to the Norwegian Hospital, where he was himself treated. The fire did \$10,000 damage.

RICH IMPORTER SUES FOR DIVORCE

Antonie Surie Jr. Says He Found Wife, Supposedly Abroad, Still Living Here.

Antonie Surie Jr., a wealthy importer and exporter, who lives at No. 3 Gramercy Park West, today sued his wife, Christine, for an absolute divorce, before Justice Cohanlan. The Justice reserved decision.

Surie said he married the defendant Oct. 13, 1915, in this city. Mrs. Annie Durant, No. 118 West 69th Street, told the court that Mrs. Surie and a man not the defendant's husband occupied a room at her house from Sept. 15 to Oct. 27 last.

Justice Cohanlan asked the attorney representing Mr. Surie, whether there was collusion, and the lawyer replied that there was positively none, as his client by the merest accident learned his wife was in this city when he believed her to be in Europe. She was served, according to the attorney, at the Plaza Hotel. A photograph of the defendant shown witnesses, was that of a beautiful young woman apparently twenty-five years old.

SUES HER MOTHER-IN-LAW.

Woman Asks \$25,000 on Charge of Alienation of Affections.

STAMFORD, Conn., June 17.—A mother-in-law was named defendant in a \$25,000 suit for alienation of her son's affections here today.

Mrs. Florence Miller, widow of a former New York grain broker, induced her son, Robert C. Miller, to leave his wife, Helen, the younger Mrs. Miller charges.

In addition Mrs. Miller alleges her husband married Mrs. Pearl Hibbard Walton, a widow, in Los Angeles April 27 last.

The Millers were married here April 7, 1915. They have one son, Robert C. Jr., three years old.


