

500 SIGHTSEERS VIEW RACE BATTLE IN CHINATOWN

Tourists Witness Fight With Whites, Chinese and Detectives as Participants.

Several score visitors in New York have first-hand knowledge to-day of what a real battle in Chinatown is like. Having heard that a lot of "phony stuff" was pulled off around Mott Street for the benefit of tourists, many occupants of two sight-seeing buses thought for a time they were seeing a stage fight.

The battle started in the Liberty Restaurant at No. 41 Mott Street shortly before midnight. While 500 spectators jammed the narrow street, detectives fought to quell in the hallway of the restaurant a fight between six white men and about twenty-five yelling Chinese.

One of the diners and a Chinaman are in the Elizabeth Street Station, prisoners, with their heads badly cut and another Chinaman in the Volunteer Hospital in a critical condition. According to the police, the fight followed an argument between Frans Vaccaro, twenty-eight, of No. 54 Mulberry Street and the five men with whom he was dining. When Carlos Sing and Sam Chin, waiters in the restaurant, objected to their wrangling, the battle began.

Detectives Kramer and Morano of the Elizabeth Street Station drove the Chinese back at pistol point. Vaccaro's companions fled. Sing, an artery severed by a broken bottle, was found lying on the floor of the restaurant.

DECLARE HORTON BANDITS WERE FORMER EMPLOYEES.

Witnesses Recognize Robbers Who Got \$24,000 From Ice Cream Company's Cashier.

Police Captain Busby said to-day his detectives had clues that might lead to the arrest of the five armed men who yesterday noon held up George Schneider, cashier of the Horton Ice Cream Company and took \$24,000 from him as he was leaving the main office in East 24th Street for the bank. The automobile in which the robbers escaped had been stolen. Detectives were told by a Horton employee that he had heard a youth in

the neighborhood say recently when Schneider carried \$50,000 to the bank, "Some day the company will lose some money if it isn't careful." This youth has been questioned. Witnesses told the police they recognized the robbers as former Horton employees.

69th Regiment Has an Outdoor Drill.
The 69th held its first regimental outdoor drill of the year last night in the form of a parade. Led by its band, the regiment left the armory, at 26th Street, at 5.30, marched down Lexington Avenue, through 23d Street, to Third Avenue, to 18th Street, to First Avenue, to 19th Street, to 27th Street, to the armory. The drill was witnessed by 2,500 persons.
