

SAYS BANK HEAD PLANNED TO VANISH

Daughter's Fiance Declares Missing Official Mapped Out Tour in Advance.

CHICAGO, July 25.—A statement that the disappearance of Warren C. Spurgin, President of the Michigan Avenue Trust Company, which was closed by bank examiners last week, was planned in advance and came simultaneously with the disappearance of Spurgin's wife and daughter, Vivian, was made to-day by Ben Newmark, chief investigator for the State Attorney's office.

Mr. Newmark's statement came after an interview with Herman Byler, university student and fiance of Miss Spurgin. According to Mr. Newmark's statement, Byler said Spurgin confessed to the embezzlement of sums of money to Mrs. Spurgin some days before the flight and also confessed to an affair with another woman.

Byler said, Mr. Newmark stated, that he helped Mrs. Spurgin and Miss Spurgin arrange their household goods for a long absence and drove with them in the Spurgin automobile to Gary, Ind., last Monday. Spurgin had left previously, he asserted. Byler received several letters from Miss Spurgin, he told Newmark, including one from Detroit, where the automobile later was found.

In her last letter to Byler, Mr. Newmark said, Miss Spurgin spoke of the marriage of the Canadian line, and added, "You know what that means."

FOR ONE DEMOCRAT IN ARMAMENT TALK

Present Plan Calls for Hughes, Underwood, Lodge, Root and Sutherland.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—The delegation to the disarmament conference will consist of five members. It is probable that the make-up will consist of Secretary Hughes, Elihu Root, ex-Senator George Sutherland of Utah and Senators Lodge and Underwood. The latter will be the only Democrat. Originally it was supposed to have seven members and to have Gen. Pershing representing the army and Admiral Wilson representing the navy on the delegation, but the arguments for the curtailing of the delegation seem to have prevailed, and the present intention is to have no military men at the council table.

FIVE BRUISED WHEN BUS SIDESWIPES WIRE FENCE.

Accident Occurs When Vehicle Turns to Avoid Auto in Brooklyn.

Five persons were bruised and scratched early to-day when a sightseeing bus driven by Saul Krest of No. 251 First Street sideswiped a wire fence of the Empire State Dairy Company at Fourth Avenue and Sixth Street, Brooklyn. The bus was en route to Manhattan from Coney Island. At Sixth Street Krest turned sharply to avoid running into a machine driven by Edward Smolney, No. 255 16th Street, Brooklyn, and the bus grazed the fence.

The injured were J. K. Silverman, No. 41 Convent Avenue; Anna Lefter, No. 24 12th Street; Samuel Hermann, No. 351 West 135th Street; all of Manhattan; Leo Goldberg, No. 671 Caldwell Avenue, the Bronx; and Jennie Mansfield, No. 210 South First Street, Brooklyn.

WON'T USE FORCE TO ARREST SMALL

Sheriff Sure There'll Be No Armed Clash Between Him and Indicted Governor's Troops.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 25.—Gov. Len Small to-day apparently won a victory in his fight to force postponement of his arrest and trial on charges of juggling \$10,000,000 in State money.

Sheriff Henry Meater of Sangamon County, on whose shoulders fall the duty of serving the warrants, said he would not use force to arrest the Governor, who is guarded by State militia.

The Sheriff said he would make an honest effort to serve the warrants, if so instructed by the court. "I may cause the Governor some worry," the Sheriff said. "I will try to use diplomacy and tact, but I will not use force."

Judge E. S. Smith is expected to hand down his decision to-morrow, holding Small subject to arrest and order the Sheriff to take him into custody. The Sheriff will probably notify the Governor that he holds a warrant for his arrest, and there the matter will drop.

Reports were current that a battalion of State troops under Col. A. F. Lorenson would be ordered to Springfield to protect the Governor to-day. If this is done, it is expected to be a demonstration to show the length to which Small and his friends are willing to go.
