

## This Pretty New York Girl Will Be Crowned Queen of Asbury Carnival To-Night



HAZEL VIRGINIA WILLIAMS

Coronation to Inaugurate Three Days' Round of Festivities as Climax to Golden Anniversary Jubilee of the Resort—Many to Participate in the Gayety.

Surpassing in splendor and in elaboration of cere-

mony its thirty resplendent predecessors, Asbury Park's annual carnival will open to-night with the crowning of Miss Hazel Virginia Williams of No. 609 West 137th Street, this city, as Queen of the Pacific.

The carnival is the climax of Asbury Park's Golden Anniversary Jubilee, which started last January with a series of expositions, followed in June

by the dedication of a statue to founder James A. Bradley.

For three days the seaside resort will blaze with pageantry, winding up Wednesday with the noteworthy baby parade, at which nearly a thousand children will compete for prizes ranging from a live pony to a kewpie doll. Golden coaches, elves, fairies, miniature Chaplins, cowboys and clowns will pass in review before thousands of guests.

The coronation ceremonies to-night will take place in the Beach Arcade Palace, gay with flags and flowers. From the "palace" steps heralds will start the ceremony by bugling. Accompanying the candidate for royal honors will be six court ladies—three of whom are from New York—Princess Cinderella and a retinue of courtiers. The actual investiture will be made by the court chamberlain.

Miss Williams, who will be Queen Titania before night, is a blonde of exquisite coloring, interested in music and a natural athlete.

"I deeply appreciate the honor of being the Queen of the children's carnival," she said to-day, "and I extend to them my blessing on the eve of my coronation. I am sure we will have a merry time."

The ladies in waiting to the Queen are Miss Marie D. Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry F. Miller of No. 241 West 102d Street; Miss Mercedes M. Wagner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willett Leo Wagner of No. 2131 Broadway, this city; Miss Evelyn Kane, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Kane of Asbury Park; Miss Sylvia J. Baker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William S. Baker of No. 615 Riverside Drive, this city; Miss Margaret DeM. West, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William H. West of No. 1743 Q Street, Washington, and Miss Hannah Primer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Primer of No. 493 Clinton Avenue, West Hoboken. Then there is the Princess Cinderella, who will be impersonated by Mrs. Beatrice M. Hall, daughter of Mrs. Emma L. Hall of No. 608 Sixth Avenue, Asbury Park.

The court ball will be celebrated tomorrow evening in the Arcade Palace, where both a symphony and a jazz orchestra will make music for the dancers.

For the baby parade Wednesday a large amphitheatre is being erected on the beach front at the foot of Sunset Lake. Prominent in the amphitheatre will be the royal pavilion.

The pageant, forming at the Beach Casino, will march down Ocean Avenue, now being transformed into a royal thoroughfare with flying flags and stately columns. The procession will circle the amphitheatre, where

the prize winners will be chosen, and then return to the avenue and disperse.

Preceding the parade, Queen Titania will ride to the amphitheatre in her golden seashell chariot, drawn by white horses in trappings of gold, followed by outriders, men-at-arms, court ladies, etc.

Following Titania will come the babes—seven or eight divisions of them. First, infants in their baby carriages, then small girls with their dolls, then children in fancy costume, the hirsute division, the express wagon hounds, and finally the float division.

Girl bathers who have been accustomed to wearing socks or no stockings at all received a shock at Hockaway Beach yesterday.

### FARES ROB TAXI DRIVER, MAKE OFF IN HIS CAB.

Beat Chauffeur and Leave Him Unconscious at Roadside.

Two men entered Benjamin A. Jaslow's taxicab at 22d Street and Broadway early to-day and told him to drive them to Inwood.

When they reached 214th Street and Ninth Avenue one tapped on the glass and told Jaslow to stop. The two then got out and ordered Jaslow from the cab. When he stepped out one of the men struck him on the head with a piece of lead pipe. He fell and they went through his pockets and took \$25 and a silver cigarette case.

They then rolled him up against the curb out of the way of passing automobiles and drove away in his taxicab. A few minutes later Policeman Finnegan found Jaslow unconscious and called an ambulance from Columbus Hospital. After treatment for lacerations of the head he was taken to his home, No. 1064 Fox Street, Bronx. The taxicab has not been recovered.
