

**AUTOS KILL FOUR
IN AND NEAR CITY**

Brooklyn and Yonkers Boys
Among Victims — Woman
Driver Arrested.

Four persons were killed by automobiles early to-day and late yesterday in and near New York City.

Frederick Romer, sixty-two, an employee of Hunter's Island Inn in Pelham Bay Park, was killed at 4 A. M. to-day in New Rochelle Road just south of the city line by an automobile driven by Asa Lawrence, forty-two, proprietor of the Hotel Lawrence, Mamaroneck. Lawrence was arrested on a technical charge of homicide.

Edward Burke, seven, of No. 39 Ashburton Avenue, Yonkers, was run down and instantly killed yesterday afternoon by an automobile owned and operated by Miss Laura L. Eiting, thirty-eight, of No. 159 Glenwood Avenue, that city. Miss Eiting was arrested on a technical charge of manslaughter and released without bail by Coroner Engle.

While riding a bicycle in 14th Avenue, near 71st Street, Brooklyn, last night, thirteen-year-old Abraham Weinstein of No. 1061 24th Street, that borough, was struck and instantly killed by a motor truck, Frank Adams of No. 10 Gavette Place, Brooklyn, who was driving, was not arrested.

William Hyslop, twenty-five of Lawrence, L. I., was struck last night by an automobile driven by Andrew Smith of Far Rockaway and thrown directly

in the path of a car driven by Walter E. Holland of Rockaway Beach which ran over him. Smith drove him to St. Joseph's Hospital, Far Rockaway, but Hyslop was dead upon arrival. The accident occurred near Lawrence Avenue, Lawrence, as Hyslop was crossing Broadway.

**THIS W. R. COLLINS
IS NO KU KLUXER**

Cincinnati Lawyer Writes He Was
Never a Kleagle and Does
Not Intend to Be.

The Evening World, Sept. 9, published what purported to be a roster of the Propagation Department of the Ku Klux Klan as prepared for circulation from the Imperial Kluge's office. Included among the names of 214 officers and employees was the name W. R. Collins, described as a Kleagle, with the address "Post Office Box 712, Cincinnati, O."

In a letter dated Oct. 3, William R. Collins, lawyer, with offices in the First National Bank Building, Cincinnati, writes his attention has been called to the publication by depositors in a bank of which he is a director. He states:

"I have never had the slightest connection with the Ku Klux Klan and never intend to have. I am a reserve officer of the United States Army, member of all the representative clubs here, member of the Masonic organization and consider myself in good standing in this community."

Lieut. Kloor to Enter Automobile Business, Hinton Stays in Navy, Farrell Is Gone.

Louis A. Kloor, Lieutenant, Junior grade, United States Naval Reserve Force, in charge of the Lighter Than Air Department Station at Rockaway Point, has been automatically dropped
