

## COAL OPERATORS REFUSE TO DEAL WITH UNION MEN

"Not Even Through the President," Counsel Says, "or Through Anybody."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Peace proposals of the union miners in West Virginia were cast aside today by counsel for the coal operators at the hearing before the Senate investigating committee.

Proposals of a settlement, put forward by Frank P. Walsh, miners' counsel, and Phillip Murray, Vice-President of the United Mine Workers, was met with a declaration from the operators that "we'll have no dealings with the United Mine Workers."

Mr. Walsh called the committee's attention to the settlement plan involving use of the committee's mediatory offices. He suggested that all attorneys in the case remain in Washington and attempt to put an end to the trouble in West Virginia by a conference.

Hardly had Mr. Walsh finished when Z. T. Vinson, the operators' chief counsel, was on his feet with a reply.

"The committee knows our attitude. We will not have anything whatever to do under any circumstances with the United Mine Workers of America or their representatives. We have declared our purpose and declared our policy and I see no reason to restate it. Our position is unalterable. We will not have conferences with a lot of outsiders under any circumstances, either separately, through this honorable committee, through the President of the United States or anybody else."

## BOSTON HEARS OF NEW RED TERRORIST PLOT.

Federal Agents Say Sacco-Vanzetti Demonstrations Were to Begin Saturday.

BOSTON, Oct. 27.—Federal agents have unearthed in Boston plans of organized radicals to spread a reign of terror over the entire United States for three days—next Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

The plot, according to the investigators, is international and was to be carried out by Reiss, who hope to all the cause of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, Italians awaiting sentences here for murder and highway robbery.

Precautionary measures were taken today by state and local police and by every Federal agency. The guard stationed around the State House has been doubled. Warnings have been sent to authorities of threatened cities.

## WANTS PUBLIC USE OF SUBWAY ROOMS

La Guardia Asks Legal Advice on Securing Comfort Stations for All the People.

The use of the comfort stations in the city-owned subways by the general public, instead of restricting them to patrons of the road, was suggested today by Aldermanic President La Guardia in a letter to Corporation Counsel O'Brien.

Mr. La Guardia also sent a copy of the Aldermanic resolution calling for a survey to ascertain the need of such stations and added that the city could ill afford the appropriations required to provide them. He seeks to know whether under existing law and contracts the operating companies using city subways can be compelled to arrange for the public use of their comfort stations and suggested that the companies might charge for care and maintenance to the amounts now owing and due the city.

## \$15,000 FOR GIRL, 16, WHO ACCUSED DOCTOR

Brought Suit for \$50,000, Alleging He Attacked Her.

A jury in the Queens Supreme Court today awarded Rosalind Green, sixteen, \$15,000 in her suit against Dr. Harry Schneider, forty-two, a physician of No. 78 Hardenbrook Avenue, Jamaica.

Mrs. Green, through her mother, Mrs. Mildred Kotcher, No. 658 Fulton Street, Jamaica, sought \$50,000 damages. The girl said that Dr. Schneider had invited her to ride in his automobile on Dec. 7, 1920, as she was on the way to the library. She had previously known the physician, she said, and accepted the offer. She testified that she was driven to Midland Parkway, where, it was alleged, the physician attacked her. Her screams brought Edward Pearson and Alfred Stolbach, two Jamaica youths, who beat Dr. Schneider severely. The defendant said he met Miss Green after she had called him on the telephone and suggested they drive to the outskirts of the city. When they reached Midland Avenue, he said, he was attacked by the two young men.
