BRONX RIVER BRIDGE HEARING ON MONDAY. Companies Want Only Structure for Pedestrians at 241st Street.

A joint hearing between the Transit Commission and the Public Service Commission for the First District will be held at the offices of the Transit Commission, No. 48 Lafayette Street, on next Monday, at 2:30 P. M. The hearing is upon the application of the New York Central Railroad Company, the New York and Harlem Railroad Company and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, for an amendment of the order issued by the Public Service Commission for the First District in 1915, requiring the construction of a vehicular and pedestrian bridge across the Bronx River Valley and over the railroad companies' tracks in the vicinity of 241st Street, the Bronx.

The companies in their application contend that conditions have materially changed since the order was issued and that steps being taken in regard to the construction of a bridge in the vicinity of 238th Street, the 241st Street structure is no longer necessary in the proportions originally planned. Therefore the companies suggest the order be amended to provide for the construction of a pedestrian bridge only at 241st Street.

Sheriff Can Close Sunday Movies in Trenton. TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 27.—Justice Thomas M. Trenchard, in the Supreme Court filed a memorandum to-day upholding the efforts of Sheriff Walter Virth to close Sunday motion picture shows in Trenton. A question as to the authority of the Sheriff to close the movie theatre was raised by the theatre owners through John P. Hogan, a ticket taker at one of the theatres. Hogan alleged false arrest. PERSHING TO GET IN HOURS BEFORE FOCH

Wireless Says Liner Bearing General Will Arrive About Noon To-Morrow.

A wireless message from Capt. Cunningham of the George Washington, racing in from Pershing into port in time to welcome Marshal Foch of France, who is coming on the Phlox, reported to-day that he was 382 miles east of Ambrose Light at noon and expected to be at Quarantine at 12 o'clock to-morrow.

Computations by shipping men did not confirm Capt. Cunningham's prediction. They could not understand how he could get to Quarantine before 1 o'clock. The French liner reported that the Paris will be at Quarantine by 2 o'clock.

The present plan is for the army tug Lexington to bring Gen. Pershing to the Battery, where he will wait to greet Marshal Foch, who will be brought up the Bay on the navy tug Vigilant.

LIBERTY BONDS REACH NEW HIGH

Victory 3-4s Rise to 99.58 and 4-3-4s Advance to 99.60.

There was pronounced strength shown in the market for Liberty Bond issues to-day, and in the final half hour of trading Victory 3-4s rose to 99.58, a new high for the year, while Victory 4-3-4s touched 99.60, thereby duplicating their previous high price. Transactions in Liberty and Victory issues totaled \$2,105,000.

The market for these bonds was helped by the terms of the new Government financing, announced this morning. The Government offered the new issue of Treasury certificates on a 4-1-4 and 4-1-2 per cent income basis, which was generally accepted as foreshadowing a

FIRST DIVIDEND PAID TO CREDITORS IN 50 YEARS

Astor Insurance Co. Was Made Bankrupt by Chicago Fire.

An echo of the great Chicago conflagration, which occurred fifty years ago, when Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a kerosene lamp, will be heard to-morrow when the present receiver of the Astor Fire Insurance Company, following the Windy City's fire, will ask Justice Mullin to allow him to pay creditors a final dividend of 1 per cent.

Should the court grant the application there will be distributed \$4,284,377, the balance of money on hand.

It will also be the first dividend that has been paid creditors in fifty years.
