

AUTO KILLS BOY, GIRL BADLY HURT, BICYCLIST DYING

Victim of Park Crash May Be Six-Day Racer—Death Under Sprinkling Cart.

An uncle early to-day in Wyckoff Heights Hospital, Brooklyn, identified the body of a boy killed by an auto truck earlier in the night as that of Joseph Blittner, seven, of No. 584 Knickerbocker Avenue, Ridgewood.

The boy's parents are ill and he was sent on an errand to a nearby store. While crossing Myrtle Avenue near Central Avenue, a truck owned and driven by Francis Librola of No. 29 Summit Street struck him. Librola carried him to the hospital where he was pronounced dead. Several hours later James Cobb, the uncle, made inquiry at Wilson Avenue Station and was told of the unidentified boy in the hospital.

A taxicab driven south in Third Avenue by Felix Flacella of No. 230 East 114th Street was in collision with an automobile driven west in 26th Street by Dr. Isidor Appleman of No. 1259 College Avenue, Bronx, early to-day.

Miss Dorothy Katterer, twenty-three, of No. 17 Ramsey Street, Winfield, L. I., was thrown with such violence against the back of the taxi seat she suffered a possible fracture of the skull and was taken to the Italian Hospital in East 83d Street in a serious condition. The friends with whom she was riding escaped injury. The police say Dr. Appleman had no operator's license and were about to arrest him when he pleaded several patients were waiting for him and was given a summons.

Thrown to the roadway when his bicycle was struck by an automobile on the east side of Central Park, near 86th Street, last night, an unidentified man was taken dying to Lenox Hill Hospital. The car was driven by Ernest Wilder of No. 155 East 83d Street, chauffeur for Max Englander of No. 271 Central Park West.

According to the police, the man's bicycle and his attire indicated he was a professional cyclist, perhaps a racer, preparing for the six-day grind. He was five feet eight, weighed 170 and wore a signet ring with the initials "J. D."

James Carey of No. 330 Prospect Place, Brooklyn, was killed yesterday afternoon when a Street Cleaning Department automobile sprinker, under which he was working at Pier 24, East River, suddenly started forward. William E. Martin of No. 1576 Flatbush Avenue, Brooklyn, suffered a fractured jaw and several lacerations. He was on the front seat. He was taken to Bellevue.
