

ROBS ROOMS HE RENTS AS LODGER, IS CLAIM

Realty Salesman Accused of Theft Totaling \$15,000.

Lieut. Commander John Adam Davis, U. S. N., according to the police, is among the victims of Thomas Scame, a dapper young real estate salesman, charged with robbing thirty persons in whose homes he rented rooms on the west side in the last few weeks. Complaints of robberies amounting to \$15,000 have been received at Police Headquarters, and the disposition there is to blame them all against Scame.


