Costigan Spy on Mayor Hylan? No, He Was Attending a Wake

"Honest Dan" Clears Up Mystery of His Visit to the Hylan Section of Brooklyn. Living up to his name, "Honest Dan" Costigan admits he was hanging around Mayor Hylan's domicile in Brooklyn. Furthermore, a man pointed out the Mayor's house to the retired Captain, who was chased out to the goats and other undesirable places until he left the department. The "mystery" came out yesterday through the Mayor, whose friends told how his Honor was being "shadowed" by "Honest Dan," hired of course by the "interests" or "a certain newspaper." A former detective had waited at the Mayor's home Monday night until 10.30 o'clock to tell him how "Honest Dan" was trailing him. "Honest Dan" was keeping tabs by walking up and down right in front of the house. He had the effrontery to stop the former detective, talk to him and give him a business card. As a matter of fact Costigan went to No. 1097 Gates Avenue, Brooklyn, Monday night to attend the wake for Arthur J. McKenna, Assistant City Editor of the New York Tribune, who died last Friday night. The address is a short distance from Mayor Hylan's home. Later Costigan and a friend took a short walk in Bushwick Avenue, smoking cigars, before going home. Costigan said to-day he met a man named Drum who formerly was a detective at the Greenpoint Station. They chatted for a while, he said, and in the course of the conversation Drum pointed out the Mayor's home. In answer to a question from Drum, Costigan spoke of his detective agency and gave the man a card. Then he and his friend walked on. And that's the true story of how "Honest Dan" has been trailing His Honor the Mayor.

THREE VICTIMS OF TAXI CRASH HELD AS DRUNK

Two Passengers Hurled From Careening Car and Badly Hurt. A taxicab going south in Third Avenue struck Patrick Reynolds' taxi at 5th Street and knocked it over against the sidewalk at 2 A. M. to-day. Two passengers in the southbound-taxi were hurled through the front window, from which they were extricated, badly cut, by a policeman. They described themselves as John Comody, twenty-five, No. 1183 Washington Avenue, Bronx, and John McMahon, thirty-two, No. 6 McDermott Street, Danbury, Conn. After Dr. Alice Paul of Flower Hospital had dressed their injuries, they were created on a charge of intoxication. The driver of their taxi, John J. Cody, twenty-five, No. 338 East 17th Street, was arrested on a charge of reckless driving while intoxicated. Reynolds, driver of the other taxi, was not seriously hurt.

NEW HOSPITAL SITE FOR FOX HILLS VETS

Estate Near Kensico Reservoir Chosen for Tubercular Patients. WASHINGTON, April 12.—After a delay of thirteen months, to which is due all the trouble over the closing of Fox Hills Hospital and the transfer of alling veterans to the city hospital at Sixa View, Staten Island, a site for a

Government hospital, just outside the City of New York, for the treatment of tubercular veterans, has been selected. The property is the estate owned by Mrs. A. W. Church of Port Chester, N. Y. It is several miles from Port Chester and about a mile and a half from the Kensico reservoir. There are about 100 acres of rolling country and woodland. The main building and a smaller building near the gate are of stone.
