

GERMANY ORDERED TO MEET DEFICIT IN REPARATIONS

Commission Calls Attention to Public Service Shortage and Bank Control.

PARIS, June 15 (Associated Press).—The Allied Reparation Commission sent a note to the German Government to-day requesting that Government to make provision for supplementary receipts to cover the deficit for its public services and approving the arrangements made by Germany for a forced loan to the minimum amount of 40,000,000 marks before Jan. 1.

The note discusses at length the question of the autonomy of the Reichsbank, but leaves the questions of supervision of German receipts and expenditures, abuses in connection with the export of capital and kindred questions to be discussed between the Allied Committee on Guarantees and the German Government.

The commission points out that the draft of the budget submitted to it makes no provision for supplementary receipts to cover the deficit on the Public Services account, which in the railways amounts to 16,886,000 marks and in the Postal Service to 2,524,000,000 marks.

The note recognizes that the law passed in Germany on May 25 last withdraws from the Government the right to direct intervention in the conduct of the Reichsbank's operations.

"It is necessary, however," continues the note, "not only that the bank should be an independent institution, but that its personnel also should be independent, and the commission is assuming that the rights of the Government regarding the nomination of a Chairman and other members of the Board of Directors are limited to a simple veto on appointments and that entire liberty of choice will be left to the shareholders and their representatives."

The commission asks that any limitation on fiduciary circulation be preceded by the covering of public expenditures by real receipts from taxation or internal loans, without recourse to the issue of treasury bills.

LEADER DECLARES HE WILL NOT STOP RAILROAD STRIKE

Jewell Says 1,225,000 Workers Are Ready For Final Test.

CINCINNATI, June 15 (Associated Press).—Officers of the rail unions will not interfere to stop a strike of the 1,225,000 shop craft and maintenance of way workers, B. M. Jewell declared in addressing the American Federation of Labor convention here to-day. Mr. Jewell is President of the Railway Employees Department of the Federation.

"The railway workers are ready for the test," said Mr. Jewell, "and if they decide to strike their decision will be complied with by their leaders."

Without opposition or debate, the delegates to-day killed a resolution proposing a radical change in the form of the organized labor movement in the United States by the amalgamation of all unions into single organizations, each covering an industry. The resolution was introduced by E. H. Fitzgerald and others representing the railway clerks.

CINCINNATI, June 15.—The Federation convention to-day ordered a drive made to bring "white collar" workers into union ranks. A resolution was adopted directing that an organizer be sent among office workers in an effort to recruit from among the 2,000,000 of such employees in the United States a strong labor organization.

CONNERS IS BETTING ON HEARST'S CHANCES

Father of Boom for Editor Making Predictions.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 15.—William J. Conners, Buffalo publisher and father of the Hearst-for-Governor boom, arrived here early to-day to confer with local Democratic leaders on the Hearst movement, he said.

He claimed that 80 per cent. of the counties in the State are for Hearst. He arrived from Syracuse where he bet William Kelley, Onondaga Democratic leader, that Hearst would carry Syracuse by 10,000.

WU WINNING EVERY FIGHT WITH CHANG

Japanese Spies Captured as Manchurians are Driven Back by Chih-li.

TIENTSIN, June 15 (Associated Press).—Reliable observers of the recent fighting along the Gulf of Liaotung say the Chihli troops of Gen. Wu Pei Fu have never suffered defeat in their drive against the Fentien Army of Gen. Chang Tso Lin, the Manchurian chieftain. The Chihli invaders, however, are reported held on their right wing.

Confirmation has been received here of the capture of Japanese spies, who were arrested as they were attempting to escape toward Shanhai-kwan and were handed over to the Japanese commandant at Chinwangtao, a treaty port on the gulf. Chihli reinforcements have been rushed to the front, with the hope of capturing Shanhai-kwan in two or three days.

GRAND JURY FREES TWO CHARGED WITH MURDER

Carbone Was Accused in Connection With Policeman's Death.

The Grand Jury in Brooklyn to-day dismissed the charge of murder against Louis Carbone, thirty-one years old, of No. 12 Luquer Street, Brooklyn, in connection with the death of Patrolman William Harrigan of No. 202 Hamilton Avenue, on April 9 last. Carbone and Harrigan exchanged blows during an altercation and Carbone struck Harrigan in the face, knocking him down. The policeman's head hit against a fire hydrant and he was killed. Carbone claimed that he was acting in self-defense.

The Grand Jury also exonerated Fred Brinkman of No. 82 St. Nicholas Avenue, Brooklyn, of a charge of murder. It was alleged that Brinkman was connected with the murder on April 25 of George Nitel, of No. 249 Grove Street. Nitel was stabbed to death.

SEEKING SLEEP, HE STANDS OFF CROWD

Friends Won't Let Muller, Due to Sail To-Day, Quit Party.

Mathias Muller, thirty-five, a glass cutter living at No. 802 East 93d Street, brought out the police reserves and detectives from the East 67th Street Station last night and fought off several hundred persons in an effort to get a good night's sleep before sailing for his old home in Germany to-day.

Muller, who is less than 5 feet tall and weighs about 100 pounds, saved his money nine years so he could go back to Germany on a visit. Last night his friends gave him a farewell celebration at Second Avenue and 82d Street.

At 10 o'clock Muller announced he was going home to bed, so as not to miss his boat. His friends refused to let him go. Muller pulled out a revolver and fired five shots. A riot call was sent in to the East 67th Street Station. While the reserves were rushing to the scene the crowd gathered.

Muller reloaded his weapon and fired two shots at the crowd before Policeman Mauro shot him. The reserves found Mauro on top of Muller, pistol in one hand and club in the other.

WOUNDED IN N. CHINA CROWD U. S. MISSIONS

American Gunboat Sails to Assist Methodists.

KIU KIANG, China, June 15.—The American gunboat Isobel has sailed for Nanchang to assist Methodists whose mission has been swamped with wounded survivors of the Northern Army, cut to pieces by Sun Yat Sen's Canton troops.


