

ANDS OF STEEL OR CITY REVIEWS MAY BE ADOPTED

Proposed by Ald. Hulbert as Economically Superior to Wooden Structures.

Stable reviewing stands of fabric steel and ornamental in design being considered for this city by Board of Estimate. To Aldermanic President Hulbert belongs the credit of the idea, and it has been endorsed by the Municipal Art Society, among other organizations, as a progressive departure from the old custom of erecting crude wooden stands for public functions.

At the next meeting of the Board of Estimate, which will be held July 1, complete data on comparative costs of both forms of structures will be available, and President Hulbert is confident these figures will prove it would be economically wise for the city to adopt the portable steel kind.

Commissioner Groves, A. Whalen of the Department of Plant and Structures, under whose supervision the stands would be erected and in whose custody the equipment would be stored, notified the Board of Estimate today that the estimated cost per seat for a steel stand would be \$5.78.

This would mean \$6,000 for a stand holding 1,000 people. Commissioner Whalen pointed out to-day that \$5,000 was paid for a wooden stand holding 600 people who viewed the police parade, and that there is nothing to prevent a contractor who may buy the stand as old lumber to put it together again and reap the benefit by selling or letting it as a stand. The steel stands, he says, are practically indestructible.

The cost of a wooden stand per seat, Commissioner Whalen says, is \$4.27. Duplication of this is necessary under the present plan every time there is a public function.

Commissioner Whalen was asked what the assembling and taking apart of steel stands would cost. Cutting and erecting, he said, would be 33 cents per seat, while removal and carrying back to the municipal garages would cost 58 cents per seat.

THREE ARE INJURED WHEN TRUCK SKIDS

Car Runs Up on Sidewalk Into Crowd of Pedestrians.

Three persons were knocked down this morning at Madison Street and Gouverneur Place by a skidding motor truck which ran up on the sidewalk. They were Abraham Yacobi, seventy-four, No. 212 Henry Street, contusions of the head; Meyer Zell, twenty-one, No. 283 Stuyvesant Street, abrasion of left arm, and Bella Weiner, eight, No. 6 Rutgers Place, abrasions of the face. All were attended by a surgeon from Gouverneur Hospital and went home.

The truck belonged to James Butler, No. 390 West Street and was being driven by Philip McDonnell, No. 800 Bedford Avenue, Brooklyn. He was not arrested.

Letters Mailed In Mid-Ocean by Schooner's Crew

U. S. Liner Signalled by Men Who Put Out in Boat.

A story of the stopping of the United States Liner President Taft in mid-Atlantic by some men in a schooner who wanted to mail some letters, was brought in to-day when the steamship docked at Pier 1, Hoboken.

Capt. Frank T. Burkhart, the ship's commander, said the liner was about 1,500 miles from New York when a schooner seven miles away sent out distress signals. The liner stopped and two men were observed setting out in a boat from the schooner. The Captain said he made ready to rescue a distressed crew, but the men in the boat shouted that they had some letters they wanted to mail.

A rope was put over and the men in the boat tied their letters to it. "I'll mail letters to them any time," said Capt. Burkhart. He said that beside the letters, the men in the boat tied a bottle of excellent wine to the rope. The Captain said he presented the wine to some passengers at dinner that evening.

STEEL HAS FEWER STOCKHOLDERS

Number Declines More Than 6,000 in Three Months.

Holdings of common stock of the United States Steel Corporation have fallen in number below the 100,000 mark, as is shown by figures given out yesterday. The number is the smallest since March, 1921. Dividends are now being sent to 99,512 individuals, as compared with 106,511 holders three months ago and with 107,439, the high record, at the end of last December. In June, 1921, there were 105,310 holders of common stock.

The 99,512 holders of common stock have average holdings of \$11.3 shares, as compared with 47½ shares in March last. The number of holders of preferred stock also has dropped. This amounted to a loss of 419 in the number of dividend checks, which were sent last month to 31,446 individuals, as compared with 31,865 in February last. The high record for preferred stock holders was made in February, 1915, when they numbered 35,912.

SUES THEATRE OWNERS FOR \$50,000 DAMAGES

Taxi Owner Charges False Arrest in Hold-Up at Capitol.

Suit against the Moreland Realty Corporation, as owners of the Capitol Theatre, was filed in the County Clerk's office to-day by John S. Portros, twenty-eight, a taxicab owner, living at No. 360 West 53d Street. Portros asked \$50,000 damages for alleged false arrest in connection with the robbery of the Capitol box office on Dec. 18 and his subsequent imprisonment for sixty days.

The indictment against Portros was dismissed on May 10, after the real robbers had been arrested and confessed.

FOUR MEN HURT IN AUTO WRECK; TWO MAY DIE

Party Crashes Into Telephone Pole in Early Morning Ride in Queens.


Four men were injured, two probably mortally, early this morning in an automobile accident in Kingsland Avenue near Peartree Street, Corona Heights, Queens.

They were in a car which struck a telephone pole and was wrecked. They were taken to Flushing Hospital.

One was said to be Harold Carmon, twenty-three years old, of No. 57 Beach Street, Manhattan. His skull is fractured. Another with a fractured skull is Alfred Sehn, thirty, a telephone company employee, living in Fourth Street, College Point, L. I.

Selig E. Nezzo, twenty-two, No. 41 Walnut Street, had minor injuries and the fourth man, slightly hurt, gave no name or address. He and Nezzo left the hospital after treatment.

Neither the cause of the accident nor the ownership of the car has been established.
