

HERRIN MASSACRE GRAND JURY BEGINS ITS INQUIRY TO-DAY

Sheriff, Coroner and Others
Witnesses as to Slaying
of 26 Miners.

MARION, Ill., Aug. 28 (Associated Press)—More than two months after twenty-six non-union workers at the Lester strip pit, which had been deserted by union bituminous coal diggers, were killed, what has come to be known as the "Herrin massacre," to-day was the subject of official inquiry.

The twenty-six lost their lives in separate attacks June 21 and June 22, the greater number the second day, when they were herded from the pit and, according to eyewitnesses, brutally shot, beaten and cut to death.

That the investigation beginning to-day would be fair and far-reaching was indicated by the announcement of Edward J. Brundage, Illinois Attorney General, that neither minor nor coal operator had been put on the especially called Grand Jury.

Mr. Brundage has been assisted in the preliminary work by C. W. Middlekauf, representing the Federal Department of Justice.

Attorney General Brundage and Mr. Middlekauf arrived here yesterday, coming from Carbondale and traveling over the road near which the non-union men were killed. A. W. Kerr, chief counsel of the Illinois Mine Workers, has been here for some time watching developments.

Among witnesses summoned are Sheriff Thaxton, his deputies and Coroner William McCowan. Col. Samuel Hunter of the Illinois National Guard, who investigated the Herrin mine war at the request of Gov. Len Small, arrived here last night ready to testify.

It was said here to-day Attorney General Brundage had advanced \$5,000 out of his personal funds to defray the expenses of the investigation, for which many witnesses have been summoned for the State.

SIR AUBREY BRISCOE ARRIVES ON BALTIC
