

## Sightless, His Ears Are His Eyes; Hears Objects as Others See Them

Atlanta's Blind Coroner Tells Why He Never Bumps Anything Even in New York Crowds.

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 14 (Copyright).—"I can hear trees, posts, buildings and the like exactly as you can see them."

Paul Donohoe, blind Coroner of Atlanta, to-day gave this explanation of how he is able to find his way along the streets, through crowded traffic.

He has just returned from a trip to New York. He insists he was able to get around there, and even pass safely the busiest corners without aid. He was asked how he could hear objects that make no noise.

"How do you see something that, after all, has no color—a strip of bleached linen, a colorless cloud, a

attuned through the absence of some other sense."

"Whatever the reason, the sense of hearing objects such as trees and posts, walls and the like is as distinct with me as are your powers of sight. If it wasn't for some such sense, I never would be able to come and go at will as I do. As it is, I meet with no accidents and never bump into any fixed object, although occasionally a hurrying individual may give me inconvenience."

Paul Donohoe is at work on a new system of shorthand for the written Braille system in use by the blind. When it is completed, he says the present method will be reduced in volume at least one-half.

At Coroner's inquests he personally takes all of the testimony.

His manner in walking confidently through the most crowded streets has amazed every one who has witnessed it.

In addition to being City Coroner, he is a practicing lawyer and accomplished musician.

## SEE RESENTMENT TO "NEWBERRYISM" IN MICHIGAN VOTE

Townsend Is Victor—Results of Primaries Held in Five States.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Michigan's primaries furnished the only thrill and portent of Tuesday's balloting.

The circumstance that nearly twice as many Republicans voted against Senator Townsend as for him is an

other manifestation of the trend to progressivism that began with Indiana and had other early chapters in Pennsylvania, Iowa and South Dakota.

These manifestations in reality were concerned less with progressivism than with a desire to take a hearty punch at the Harding Administration.

In his declarations Townsend was not very far away from the radicalism of the others, but, as was the case with McCumber in South Dakota, it was not what he said but what he had done that labelled him stand-patter. The shibboleth in the campaign was "Newberry."
