HARVARD AND CENTRE ELEVENS MEET IN GAME BEFORE CROWD OF 50,000

Contest Will Decide Winner of Three-Season Inter-sectional Series.

M'MILLAN OUT OF GAME

Crimson Throws Full Strength on Field Against "Praying Colonels."

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 21.—Before a crowd of more than 50,000 spectators and under weather conditions ideal for football with the sun high and bright and a crisp north-west breeze cutting across the field the Harvard and Centre College elevens clashed here this afternoon in the deciding game of their three-season inter-sectional series.

By a determination that the stand of the presidents of the "Big Three," Harvard, Yale and Princeton, against the continuation of inter-sectional grid contests this year probably mark the final appearance here for some time to come of the sensational eleven from the little Southern college.

By a determination that the Praying Colonels must not depart with a victory that the near future promises little chance to redeem the Crimson threw its full strength on the field for the fray to-day. Centre, while minus the great McMillan at quarterback, was able to present no less than seven of the veterans of last year's combination which sent Harvard down last year under a 6 to 0 defeat.

The Kentuckians' squad numbers twenty-five, but their reserve players are not imposing, and as is their custom, the "Praying Colonels" before going into action this afternoon had better offer a special prayer to the football gods to spare them from further casualties, as the remaining regulars can't be spared.

THE FORD LEADS AT SECOND TURN IN FISHERMAN'S RACE

Officials Postpone Contest, but Captains Disregard Signals and Start Off.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 21 (Associated Press).—Henry Ford took a lead of 100 yards over the Canadian Bluenose at the start of the first international fisherman's race to-day.

Both Captains had disregarded the Race Committee's signal to postpone the start to 10:30 o'clock. At 10:10, with the Henry Ford enjoying a lead of a quarter of a mile, the judges sent out a recall but both skippers kept on the course.

The course was a five-mile run to the first mark, ten-mile reach off shore, a beat of ten miles to the third mark, a ten-mile run to the fourth mark, and a five-mile beat to the finish.

Banner of Party Strife Hoisted by Tories; He's for Public.

LEEDS, Oct. 21.—"The banner of party strife has been hoisted at the Carlton Club. The people must decide whether the party or the nation comes first. I stand for the people."
