

## Drop Trifles, Plan Laws on War, Ohio Woman Justice Tells Sex

Florence E. Allen, Who Will Serve in State Supreme Court, Defines Country's Greatest Problem.

"The need for a law against war is the greatest problem that confronts the country to-day. Justice-elect Florence E. Allen of the Ohio Supreme Court said, speaking before the Women's Union of the Brooklyn Society for Ethical Culture at the Academy of Music yesterday. Judge Allen—she is now a Judge of Common Pleas in Cleveland and the first woman ever elected to the higher court—said that war would never be abolished until it became as great a crime to kill a man to settle a public dispute as it is now to murder a man in a private argument.

"We shall be tested principally by our attitude upon international matters," said Judge Allen. "We must demand of this Nation that it never commit an aggressive act which will give any other nation cause for war. We must demand that ethical standards be put into force by our Government in all foreign relations.

"Foreign affairs seem so remote that many men and women have a feeling about international morality different from that which they have about private morality. Men who would not kill a wasp or an ant will juggle with the lives of young men and the hearts of mothers when it comes to international matters."

Judge Allen warned her audience that there was a tendency on the part of the public to attempt to persuade women that they should study the theoretical forms of government and ignore the lack of a proper budget system. She also said that when women voters of a community demanded an outlet for their energy they were urged to study problems of garbage disposal or street cleaning while ignoring international relations.

"Better service should also be demanded from public officials," said Judge Allen. "Even from the highest and most public-spirited men we will never get better service until we raise the standard of our demand. We have to face the actualities of government. Of what profit to result

## DRY LAW REPEAL IN NEW JERSEY PLANNED BY WETS

G. O. P. Senators See "About Face" in Prohibition Question by People.

ATLANTIC CITY, Nov. 20.—That the Republican majority in the State Legislature will execute an "about face" on the prohibition question as a result of the recent election was made manifest at a meeting of the Republican Senators held at the Fitz-Carroll. The legislators were the guests of Senator Emerson T. Richards.

Although efforts have been made to keep the result of the conference secret, it was learned the Republican Senators have selected Joseph F. Wallworth of Camden for President of the Senate. William K. Stevens of Long Branch is slated for majority leader in the Upper House. Senator Wallworth has taken a

## COURT DECIDES TO-DAY ON JERSEY TAX CASE

Companies say State Board's Valuation Figures Too High.

TRENTON, Nov. 20.—The Court of Errors and Appeals is expected to hand down a decision to-day confirming or setting aside a valuation of \$28,554,782 made by the State Board of Taxes and Assessment on railroad property along the water front in Jersey City for the year 1920. Assessments aggregating \$31,242,540 were made on these properties by Jersey City and the companies ap-

pealed to the State Board asking that the assessments be reduced to \$18,405,777. When the State Board fixed its valuation the companies appealed to the Supreme Court, which upheld the action. Appeals were then taken to the Court of Errors and Appeals from the State Board's valuations.
