

UNION TERMINAL ON JERSEY MEADOWS NOW IN PROSPECT

Devising Transfer Facilities for New York a Commission Problem.

Erection of a union railroad terminal somewhere on the Jersey meadows, with transfer facilities to electric tubes running to New York, will be one of the recommendations likely to be made to the New Jersey Legislature in January, when the North Jersey Rapid Transit Commission makes its first report.

The commission, which was appointed to study the problem of carrying commuters to New York when the railroads shall no longer end at the ferry slips, has been handicapped by lack of funds, but it has gathered enough information to warrant the recommendation that the State of New Jersey give the problem as much consideration as the Port of New York Authority is giving the handling of the freight situation in the port zone.

"The problem confronting the commission," said Spaulding Fraser, one of the Commissioners, "is one of coordinating transit facilities so as to assure a rapid and convenient carriage of passengers from the point of origin to the point of destination. At present the major part of this problem consists of transportation between New Jersey municipalities and the City of New York.

"A minor phase but an important one concerns itself with intermunicipal transit—transit wholly in New Jersey, the present lines of the railroads being constructed almost wholly with reference to the carrying of passengers from points in New Jersey to New York and with very little consid-

eration of the needs of residents of New Jersey travelling from one New Jersey municipality to another."

13 REDS SURRENDER, WANTED IN CHICAGO, BUT LLOYD IS ABSENT

Another Convicted Communist Is Hastening Prisonward.

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—Smiling and jolting about the hard beds they are to occupy, thirteen of the eighteen Communists sentenced to prison for violation of the Illinois Espionage Act marched into the Criminal Court Building yesterday and signified their willingness to start serving their terms.

William Bros Lloyd, Winnetka millionaire and alleged leader of the group, was not with his colleagues, however. He is expected to surrender within two or three days. One of the other defendants is on his way here from Moscow, Russia, and another is in a hospital at De Kalb, Ill.

All carried grips containing clothing and comforts they would not be able to get in prison. Some had copies of Communist magazines and other radical literature.

Those sentenced to the State Institution were taken at once to Joliet by deputy sheriffs. The others walked to the jail next door.

BIG BUCKS BAGGED BY DEER HUNTERS IN UP-STATE HILLS

Black Bear Abound Also—Record Set in Season Just Closed.

MONTICELLO, N. Y., Nov. 21.—The fifteen days' deer hunting season in Sullivan County has closed with a record of many large bucks being killed, probably more than in any former year. Every farm and boarding house was filled with hunters and many slept in tents and barns.

The largest buck ever killed in Sullivan County was shot by Lloyd Bates at Bridgeville. The animal weighed 320 pounds, and as its horns were flat like those of a moose, old hunters believed it was a cross between a moose and a deer. No similar specimen had ever been seen before in this section.

Several women were among the army of hunters, but only one was successful in bagging a deer. Mrs. T. G. Staples of Middletown, hunting at Oakland Valley, killed a 200-pound buck with a single rifle shot.

Four black bears and three wildcats were shot by the deer hunters. John Linder and Alex Williams shot a 150-pound cub. They wounded the animal and it climbed a tree, where they ended its career. The mother bear escaped. Peter Kiro of New York City shot a 250-pound bear and wounded another, which escaped.

Alex Moore and Robert Whitaker of Rio shot a bear that weighed 220 pounds. Ed Edwards of Monticello shot a bear that weighed 209 pounds. More bears have been seen in Sullivan County during the last two weeks than in twenty-five years before.

BARBER CLAIMS MILLIONS.

Asserts He Is Heir to Estate Held by Bank of France.

THREE RIVERS, N. J., Nov. 21.—L. Demange, a barber, to-day claimed to be an heir to a \$12,000,000 estate held in Paris by the Bank of France, which a dispatch from Windsor, Vt., to a Montreal newspaper said, was to go to a Richard Demange of Vermont.

The barber said he would take steps to claim part of the estate which was deposited in the Bank of France by a brother of his grandfather, Nicholas Demange, who came to Canada in 1815 and founded the town of Drummondville, Que. He said there were other heirs in New England.


