

Housewives' Guide of Market Prices

With the end of warm weather, blue fish and mackerel are out of season and had and king fish have taken their places on the fish market. Fine haddock roe is also new this week and sells at 30 cents per pound. Very little fresh salmon is on sale as the Western shipments decrease with the approach of winter. Despite the cold spell there are heavy supplies of fish in New York, and fishermen report a brisk trade for the better known fish, such as halibut and salmon.

Shad will cost the housewife 40 cents per pound, and is good broiled, baked or boiled and served with sauce; Boston mackerel, fillet and sea bass are also 40 cents per pound, white fish, king fish and smelts are 30 cents per pound; halibut is 45 cents and stripped bass, 50 cents per pound, weak fish are 30 cents per pound; flounders, 15 cents; haddock, 12 cents. Lobsters are scarce and expensive at \$1 per pound; scallops and crab flake are bringing 60 cents per pound; green shrimp, 30 cents per pound.

The latest turkey news gives no indication of a low priced Thanksgiving bird, although if more turkeys are shipped than operators expect there is likely to be a price similar to that of 1921, which was between 60 and 75 cents per pound. Two cars of Canadian birds were offered at 52 cents plus 6 cents duty, which would be 58 cents per pound had down in New York. Fancy Maryland and Kentucky turkeys are selling at that figure now, but the bulk of the first grade trade wholesales around 53 and 55 cents per pound.

Beside the turkey there is always a demand for small pigs for Thanksgiving dinner, and from now on many will be put on the market to attract the shopper. These pigs weigh between 10 and 20 pounds and have been selling at 25 to 30 cents per pound for the 10 to 12 pound variety, and 15 to 23 cents for those between 14 and 20 pounds. The retail price will be from 8 to 12 cents above the wholesale figure. Maryland ducks,

also popular at Thanksgiving time, are beginning to arrive and sell at 25 to 30 cents per pound wholesale; guineas, spring, wholesale, \$1 to \$1.25, 2 pounds to the pair. Ducks cost the housewife 30 to 40 cents per pound, and guineas, \$1.50 to \$2 per pair.

Four New Brunswick (Canada) potato shippers, in trying to find a market for 5,000,000 bushels of potatoes, are said to be purchasing a chain of potato houses in Aroostook County, Me., to tap United States markets. According to the Produce Price Current, they are convinced that the surplus can be sold to better advantage through Maine than by paying the freight rates the Canadian railways are charging in shipping to the seaport. In New York Jersey (Giant), wholesale, \$1.60 to \$1.70 per 150 pound sack; Long Island, \$2.25 to \$2.69 for the same quantity, and State, \$2 to \$2.10. Retail potatoes are 5 pounds for 9 cents in the chain stores, and 3 pounds for 25 cents in the markets.

The first importation of Danish butter since last March was unloaded Thursday, and amounted to 25 cases. The price duty paid was 52 cents landed in New York. Yesterday 209 more cases were expected at a cost of 52½ cents per pound; and 200 other cases, each weighing about 112 pounds net, were to leave Copenhagen Nov. 18. Operators claim that it costs a little over 1 cent per pound to bring the butter from Copenhagen in a refrigerator, and the duty is 8 cents.

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The shipment of cranberries from Russia was a disappointment to the wholesale dealers, who had expected the consignment to be in first class condition. So poor were the berries that few buyers were found for them. Receipts from New England continue to arrive for the holiday season, 95 barrels and 652 boxes having come by Fall River steamers Tuesday. The price is \$6 to \$14 per barrel for fine cranberries wholesale and 15 to 18 cents per pound in the chain stores.
