NEW JERSEY.—The Election in this State on Tuesday and Wednesday last, resulted as follows: Whig Majorities in Assembly and Joint Ballot, 10.

We lose the Council and part of the Assembly, in Gloucester and Passaic, by local efforts, and might have carried Salem by a proper effort.

And now we hope one of the first acts of the Wing Legislature will be to make the Banks resume Specie Payments. The People are sick of excuses for Suspension, and we trust no Wing Legislature will submit to it a week longer.

THE CONVENTION OF THE FRIENDS OF HOME INDUSTRY assembled in the lecture-room of the Lyceum of Natural History at 10 1/2 o'clock yesterday, and was organized by the choice of General JAMES TALLMADGE as President.

OLD CHENANGO is in the field! The Whigs have nominated ABRAHAM PER LEE of Norwich, JOSEPH JULIAND of Greene and JOHN HARRIS of New-Berlin for Assembly.

Hon. DAVID RUSSELL of Washington County has been nominated by the Whigs of the Fourth District for Senator. He has been long and favorably known as a Member of Assembly and of Congress, and will make a faithful and efficient Senator.

Gen. GEORGE R. DAVIS of Troy, a highly respectable and ardent Federalist so long as the Federal party existed, since an eminent Safety Fund Bank Commissioner under the Regency rule, is in nomination as a Van Buren candidate for Assembly.

Wilmington, Del. has elected Van Buren charter officers, as usual.

All the new Members of the Cabinet having arrived at the Seat of Government have entered upon the duties of their respective Departments, and were called together to-day for the first time by the President in Council.

John G. Wainwright is appointed Surveyor of the Port of Philadelphia. Applicants for the vacancy occasioned by the death of Gen. Irvine, late Commissary General at Philadelphia, are numerous and pressing.

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HARLEM RAILROAD.—A Meeting of the Stockholders of the Harlem Railroad was held yesterday at the City Hotel, at which a Report was made by a Committee appointed at a previous Meeting.

This, in the opinion of eminent counsel, gives the right claimed. In 1837 a loan was negotiated with Ed. R. Biddle, Esq. for \$400,000, of which \$50,000 was received, when Mr. B. gave notice of his inability to fulfill the contract, which occasioned much embarrassment to the Company.

The Committee express an opinion that the Directors, Officers, &c. of the Company have fulfilled their duties with diligence and faithfulness. No instance of delinquency had come to their knowledge.

The property of the Company consists of a double track from the City Hall to Harlem, eight miles, flat bar, a bridge at Harlem, eight miles, heavy wrought iron rail weighing six pounds to the yard.
