THINGS IN WASHINGTON.

Progress of Work in the House—Ratification Meeting last night—Dinner to Senator Crittenden.

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, June 13.

Much was done in the House to-day toward the perfection of the Naval Appropriation Bill. Many amendments were discussed and passed, some of greater and others of less importance. Mr. Schenck of Ohio, did most of the talking. Mr. S. always speaks well, but it is necessary he should speak always! If he did not carry all his propositions to-day, the failure cannot be attributed to any want of proper explanation on his part. To-morrow, it is confidently expected, the Naval Appropriation bill will go through.

The Senate has not acted upon Mr. Ashurst's resolution to adjourn on the 17th proximo. It is supposed, however, it will be adopted by that august body with an amendment to meet again during the first of October.

Should this be the speech of Members in favor of either candidate will be reserved for the stump, perhaps no less appropriate place for them than the floor of Congress.

The Ratification meeting last night called in its homeward course upon Mr. Webster, Mr. Ashurst and Mr. Speaker WINSTROP. It was deep into the hours of night when the call was made. Sleep possessed wholly the three distinguished gentlemen. The crowd was too impudent to await Mr. Webster's appearance, though he gave as much energy to his determination to present himself as could be expected from a person roused up in the "small hours" of the morning. Mr. Ashurst shook off Somnus by a desperate resolution, and appeared before the multitude. He did not desire to delay them from their comfortable beds, and made no address as pertains to the words could not be said. He thanked them for the early call, and bidden them good night, advised them to rise in the first morning to work zealously for "Old Zack."

Mr. WINSTROP said that although the nominees of Massachusetts had not been preferred by the Convention, still his friends with his hearty concurrence had gone into the Convention, under the implied pledge of supporting the nominees, whenever he could. He left himself bound in honor to support all his ability and all his skill. Gen. ZACHARY TAYLOR.
