Mexican Items. From our files of El Monitor Republicano to Dec. 14, we translate the following: Don Pedro Garcia Conde, and the officers of the Mexican Boundary Commission left Oahuahu on the 23d of November, for Paso del Norte.

WHIG GENERAL COMMITTEE. - The senior Whig General Committee meet this evening, at the Broadway House, to perfect their organization. We presume that what we might say would have little weight with some of those who have made arrangement to do as they please.

MASSACHUSETTS ELECTION. A special election was held in Massachusetts yesterday for the choice of Congressmen in the 11th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th and 18th Districts.

RETURNS FROM 14 TOWNS in this (17th) District show a Whig gain of 609 since the last trial, when the Whig candidate, Mr. Geo. T. Davis, of Greenfield, lacked a trifling over 600 votes to secure an election.

FROM THE BERKSHIRE (11th) District we have but few returns—probably no choice again. In the Fourth District the returns, so far, show a large gain for Thompson, Whig, over Palfrey and the Opposition candidate; the result will be close, and the probabilities are in favor of Thompson.

IN THE THIRD DISTRICT, Lowell shows a large gain for Duncan, Whig, who is doubtless elected, as the majority against him at the last election was small. In the Tenth District, New Bedford gives Scudder, Whig, 243 gain; he is doubtless elected, as the majority against him at the last election was less than 200. The vote is very small.

FOURTH DISTRICT.—Charlestown gives Thompson, Whig, a gain of over 100. Cambridge also gives a large Whig gain. Probably no choice in the District, but Thompson will come very near election.

SECOND DISTRICT.—Salem gives Upham, Whig, 1,188; Rantoul, Opp. 306; Sewell, 252; Scattergood, 20. A Whig loss of 63. Other towns give a Whig gain, but there is probably no choice in this District.

IN THE THIRD DISTRICT, Lowell gives Duncan, Whig, nearly 500 majority, a gain sufficient to elect him. No choice probably in the Fifth District. The Free Soilers in the Fourth District seem to have deserted Palfrey on account of his letter against the Coalition.

In Congress Yesterday. In the SENATE, after the presentation of several reports, Mr. CLAY submitted a Resolution instructing the Committee on Commerce to inquire into the expediency of adopting more effectual means to prevent American vessels and seamen from engaging in the African Slave Trade.

The House refused to make five of the General Appropriation bills the special order for to-day and until disposed of. The House also refused to suspend the rules to introduce a bill giving land to the landless.

Mr. CLAY'S REMARKS on presenting to the Senate memorials in favor of Colonizing the Free Colored People of this country along the western coast of Africa, so as promptly, thoroughly and finally to suppress the African Slave-Trade, and at the same time pave the way for the civilization and Christianization of the most degraded and abused quarter of the globe.

The Express emphasizes the fact that Gov. Seward lately presented to the Senate some petitions from his constituents relating to Slavery in the District and the Fugitive Slave Law, (which petitions were laid on the table) and says:

While these things are done by our Senator in Washington, we hear from Albany that every friend of the Administration is told to keep still, and to do nothing showing that the great State acquiesces in the compromise bills, and wishes their representatives to cease from further agitation.

Without stopping to ask what The Express (which once pretended to uphold the Right of Petition) means by reflecting on Gov. Seward for merely presenting memorials from his constituents and moving their appropriate reference, we beg the Silver Grays, once for all, to pass their resolves approving and promising to sustain the Fugitive Slave Law if they can.

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
