HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. The House went into Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union, and resumed the consideration of the bill relative to the salaries of officers of the territories of the United States.

Mr. JOHNSON (Ark.) offered a proviso, that nothing in the act shall be construed to prevent the payment of the salary of the Judge of the Territory for the reasons set forth in the report to the President.

Mr. STUART repeated that if the officers had remained they could have furnished information of the facts which occurred, but by allowing it to be difficult to execute the laws, officers should abandon their posts.

Mr. CLEVELAND advocated the amendment, and said that, without investigating the facts, Congress should not punish the returning officers by denying them the privilege of returning to their homes.

Mr. SIBLEY opposed the amendment, as it was incumbent on the House to guarantee the people of the Territories against the evils caused by the continued absence of their officers.

Mr. MEACHAM replied to Mr. Stuart, that there was great danger to the officers. Their return would be a great relief to the moral community.

Mr. JONES (Tenn.) moved an amendment, the substance of which was to pay the officers from the time they left the States until they returned from Utah.

Mr. POLK said that by the act which established the Territorial Government of Utah, the President appointed Brigham Young Governor.

Mr. RICHARDSON justified the officers for leaving Utah. Mr. GIDDINGS appealed to the Committee to take a vote on the business before them.

Mr. Barnes's Sermon. WASHINGTON, D. C., Thursday, May 20, 1852. At 11 o'clock yesterday, the General Assembly, according to their usual custom, was opened with a Sermon by the late Moderator, Rev. Albert Barnes.

The diversity of sentiment among Protestant denominations was alluded to, and explained by the diversity in the minds of men. This has been seen in all aged communities, even in the Church which prides herself on others on her being one.

Mr. Barnes spoke in the highest terms of commendation of the late Moderator, and expressed his opinion that the Church Extension idea of the New School Church was the index of an actual want which could not be stayed off.

Mr. Barnes expounded the position of the Church on the subject of slavery, referring to the resolutions of the General Assembly which he never could recede. The whole examination of these grounds was a manly and noble one.

After the sermon, the Assembly proceeded to organize and elect officers. Mr. Barnes was elected Moderator, and Rev. John M. Lewis, of the Presbytery of Hudson, was elected temporary Clerk.
