THE PACIFIC RAILROAD.

THE U. S. SENATORIAL QUESTION IN PA. HARRISBURG, Monday, Jan. 12, 1857. The Republican Caucus adjourned this evening without making a nomination for United States Senator. They meet again to-morrow morning. Mr. Benson, Republican member from Luzerne County, is yet absent, but is expected to-night. The election cannot be held to-morrow, as no Teller has been elected by the Senate, as the law requires to be done on the day prior to the election. The Democratic members will aid the election signed going to-morrow, but the decision of the United States Senate in the Iowa case to-day has thrown cold water upon that design.

THE SENATORIAL QUESTION IN MISSOURI. ST. LOUIS, Monday, Jan. 12, 1857. The Democrats in caucus on Saturday night nominated James S. Green for U. S. Senator for the short term. The Know-Nothings have nominated Luther M. Kennett and W. F. Switzer as their candidates.

PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATURE. HARRISBURG, Monday, Jan. 12, 1857. The Senate refused to-day to consider the resolution to go into Joint Convention to-morrow for the election of a United States Senator, by a vote of 17 to 14. Mr. Brown, Democrat, paired off with a Southern Republican. It is evidently the intention of the Senate not to meet the House.

UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT. WASHINGTON, Monday, Jan. 12, 1857. Case No. 32.—James H. Ure, claimant of steamer Gipsy, appellant, vs. James M. and Cyrus Gettman, owners of said steamer and cargo. Judge Wayne delivered an opinion affirming the decree of the Circuit Court of Eastern Louisiana, with costs and interest.

FROM BERKUDA.—MARINE DISASTERS. HALIFAX, Monday, Jan. 12, 1857. The steamship Delia, from St. Thomas January 2, and Bermuda the 8th, arrived here to-day. The ship, 30 days from Cuba for New York, got put into Bermuda on the 29th of December with loss of 14 men, 300 tons of cargo, and the ship. She was run into a reef by the brig Norfolk, of Richmond. The Norfolk was not seen after the collision, the captain of the Julia thinks that she was not seriously injured.
