

LATER FROM HAVANA.

A British Naval Force Landed.

SEARCH FOR IMPORTED NEGROES.

ARRIVAL OF THE BLACK WARRIOR.

The United States steamer Black Warrior, J. W. Smith Commander, from New-Orleans via Havana, sailed from the latter port on the 15th inst. and arrived in New-York early on Thursday morning, May 20. From Havana it is stated that the insoulation and aggressions of the English gun-boats continue. A few days since they landed a detachment of marines as one of the outer posts of the island, and searched the plantations in the vicinity for boat negroes, but the captain of the post at which the landing was effected has been ordered to Havana for trial for not having resisted the invasion and for the Spanish flag. The health of Havana is said to be good. The stock of sugar was \$20,000 boxes; prices slightly receding. Exchange on New-York, par to 1 cent; on London, 12 1/2 cent premium. Freights were active.

FROM BOSTON.

From Our Own Correspondent.

BOSTON, May 19, 1858.

James McKee, the murderer of Deputy Warden Galen S. Walker, has been ordered for execution on Friday, the 25th of June. McKee was convicted and sentenced on the 11th of April, 1857. He had the benefit of the law which provided that execution should not take place until a year after sentence, a law which, during the excitement consequent upon the murders at the State Prison, was repealed. A Committee of the Council have had his case under consideration. The evidence as to the prisoner's insanity at the time of the murder was the same as that which was submitted to the Jury, and the Council declined to revise their decision. On the question whether he had become insane since his sentence, the Council took the opinion of two or three of their own number, and of a clergyman who had visited him—quite a new mode of obtaining testimony on so delicate a question. I suppose the Councilors and the Rev. Mr. Stickney will now set themselves up as experts in the matter of insanity, and Dr. Bell, Dr. Chandler and Dr. Jarvis will be knocked out of employment. Possibly these gentlemen mean to set up in life as witnesses by trade. We shall probably soon see them called to testify in patent cases, and in cases of civil and criminal engineering, and so on. The only other evidence taken was that of Mr. Haynes, the new Warden of the prison, who thought if McKee escaped, he should not be safe. This seems to have settled the question. Luckily, the institution of the Jury remains; if it were not for this, the same reason would hold good for hanging a dozen others, or as many as Warden Haynes might fancy to be dangerous to his safety. I observe that Loetzer, the Cincinnati murderer, is dissatisfied because he is not to be hanged. Why cannot a system of inter-State exchanges be established? McKee, I suppose, would rather not be hanged; Loetzer has a passion that way. Let Ohio send Loetzer for execution, and let McKee go to New-York to be hanged, and the matter would be settled. The thing might be quietly arranged, so that the murderer in the prison when the Warden so much fears would not know anything about it. And the comforting assurance that at 11 o'clock on a certain day a man was put to death in the Boston jail-yard, which is supposed by many to be the only security the people have against wholesale massacre, conflagration and anarchy, would be afforded, just as well as if the reluctant criminal had suffered.

THE TRIAL OF CONNOLLY—VERDICT OF THE JURY.

THE OFFICIAL CORRUPTION IN WISCONSIN.

MADISON, Wis., May 14, 1858.

The report of the select investigating Committee of the Wisconsin Legislature on the La Crosse Railroad Land Grant Corruptions, so long and anxiously looked for, has finally been made. It is quite voluminous, and makes a book of between 400 and 500 pages of closely-printed matter, comprising the report of the Committee and the testimony in the case. It presents a full and complete statement of the affairs of the La Crosse and Milwaukee Railroad Company, with a history of its transactions from the beginning of its organization, and discloses the startling fact that full one-half of the Members of the Legislature in 1850 were interested in and paid for all or a portion of the La Crosse and Milwaukee Railroad Land Grant scheme. The price paid was graduated according to the position and influence of the individual. The price for Senators was ten thousand dollars, and members of the other House, five thousand. This was, however, a mere nominal sum, as could be seen by the extraordinary influence of the names of the several corruptors, with the amounts they received, are set forth in the Report, and presents a record which may well cause posterity to blush for their ancestors. The payments were made in bonds and stock of the La Crosse road, which at the time, he converted into cash at sixty to seventy cents on the dollar. In settling the preliminaries, there seems to have been a distrust on the part of both contracting parties. It was therefore arranged that the bonds for Senators should be deposited in the hands of ex-Gov. Barstow, and that for members of the other House, in the hands of A. Hays, Smith.

HOW STRANGERS LIKE OUR GENTLE MANNERS.

SIR: Believing that when events occur in the community that can be justly characterized by the terms used in the caption of this communication, they will always find a ready place for exposure and condemnation, as well as suitable comment, in the columns of THE TRIBUNE, I desire to state, for the benefit or warning of whom it may concern, that while walking directly from Broadway to my lodgings in Clinton place, at 8 o'clock on Friday evening last, I was assailed and knocked down by a blow in the face from a person who was standing at the corner of Mercer street. Notwithstanding the severity of the blow and the injuries received, I immediately rose to my feet, but in time to capture the ruffian, who at once took to his heels and succeeded in making his escape, though pursued by me down Mercer nearly to Bleeker street, when I lost sight of him. Through all the distance passed over no policeman was visible; and among the number of persons passed in the chase no interest was shown, and no sign was given that anything unusual had occurred. But the object of the assault was doubtless plunder; the assailant, seeing he had not sufficiently stunned his victim, and that he was a tall, athletic man, thought it not best to risk the consequences of a further attempt, and sought escape by flight.

THE LATE ANSON G. PHELPS.

On Wednesday afternoon a special meeting of the Board of Managers of the New-York State Colonization Society was held at the Society's room, No. 27 Bible House.

The Rev. Dr. P. Phelps, one of the Vice-Presidents, took the chair, and opened the meeting with a most fervent prayer. He alluded to the bereavement which had fallen upon society generally, and especially upon the Colonization Society, by the sudden death of their beloved presiding officer, one who had done so much for the cause of Colonization, who was emphatically the friend of the colored race, and whose death and aim was the amelioration of their condition. Dr. D. W. Hunt was followed by the Rev. Dr. PINSKY, and Dr. D. M. REESE, for which the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

MEETING IN BEHALF OF ST. ANN'S CHURCH FOR DEAF MUTES.

A meeting of citizens and ladies interested in the welfare of the deaf mutes of this city, took place on Wednesday evening in the hall of the Historical Society, Second avenue. Bishop POTTER presided. The object of the meeting was stated to be to make provision for the maintenance of its pastor, the Rev. Thomas Gallaudet, through whose Christian efforts the Church had been organized. Mr. Gallaudet had been appointed by the Board of Managers of the Society, and had been in the city for some time, but had restricted his usefulness as pastor of the Church. The proposition now is to relieve Mr. Gallaudet from his labors in the Institute, that he may devote his whole time and talents to the welfare of the Church. Resolutions were proposed to the effect that a sum of \$1,000 per annum be introduced by Dr. P. of the Deaf and Dumb Institute, and were sustained in address by Dr. P. Prof. DOUGLASS, the Rev. Dr. EISENHART, Bishop POTTER and others. The resolutions were adopted. Remarks were also made by several deaf mutes, members of the Church, in the language of the proposition to the spiritual interests of the deaf mutes in this city. The response manifested a generous sympathy with the project.
