A YACHT CRASH.—ONE PERSON DROWNED.—Corner Schurmer held an inquest on Thursday, at No. 308 Second avenue, upon the body of Marshall Homes, a native of this city, 23 years of age, who was drowned while on a yachting excursion on Wednesday afternoon.

DISORDERLY HOUSE.—The police of the Sixth Precinct, on Saturday night, raided a disorderly house in Lefferts street, near Wilkes, E. D., and arrested several of the inmates.

FATAL SCAFFOLD CASUALTY.—An inquest was held at the Fourth Precinct Police Station by Coroner Jackson on the body of John McGowan, an Irish laborer, 30 years of age, who died from a fall from a scaffold erected in front of the premises No. 20 Abingdon street to the sidewalk, a distance of 25 feet or more.

A BOY ACCIDENTALLY DROWNED.—About 10 o'clock yesterday afternoon, John Meeks, a lad 9 years of age, was at play on the pier, foot of a woman's building, when he fell into the water. He was rescued by some other child, but his clothes filled with water, and he was unable to swim, and he sank.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT.—Thos. Dillon, an Irishman, 63 years of age, died on Thursday at the New York Hospital from injuries received on the New York and New Haven Railroad, at the corner of Hudson and Light streets. The fragments of a railroad car which had struck him were found in the hospital.

LARCENY AND RECEIVING STOLEN GOODS.—Will Barton, a workman in a factory, was arrested on Thursday, charged with stealing copper to the value of \$50 from the shop of his employer, and being found in possession of the stolen goods. He was committed to the Tombs.

ACCIDENTS BY STORM.—During the shower on Wednesday afternoon, the wind blew very heavily in Newark and New York City, and in the Kills. One man in Newark Bay had his topmast carried away by the violence of the wind. In the Kills, a schooner in the Kills had her sails blown away.

REAR DODS.—Two mad dogs were killed by the Police on Wednesday evening, one in Fourth avenue and the other in Fifth avenue streets. No persons were attacked or bitten by them.

BROOKLYN ITEMS.

THE JOINT BOARD OF SUPERINTENDENTS AND ALDERMEN.—An adjourned meeting of the Joint Board met last evening, Ad. Kalbfleisch in the chair. The police contingent fund was increased \$30,000, making the whole amount for police expenses \$24,700.

VISIT OF THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT OF POLICE.—General Superintendent Pilsbury, accompanied by Mayor Powell, Commissioner Stranahan, and Deputy Superintendent Folk, paid a visit to the different Station-Houses throughout the city yesterday, and expressed himself pleased with their condition, and the general appearance of the force in this section of the Metropolitan District.

A number of workmen are engaged in taking up the pavement in Atlantic street, preparatory to laying the tracks for the proposed horse railroads.

The Union Ferry Company are painting their houses, &c., on the side of Fulton Ferry, and they begin to put a neat appearance.

The city offices are now opened at 9 a. m. and closed at 12 m., which will continue until the second Monday in September.

The new Water Commissioners made their first official visit to Ridgewood Reservoir, and along the line of the works, on Wednesday.

WILLIAMSBURG HARMONIC SOCIETY.—Yesterday afternoon this Society held a musical festival at Myrtle-avenue Park, which was very fairly attended. The exercises consisted of national airs by the band, singing, "Star Spangled Banner" by the company, overture by the orchestra, choruses, an address by Mr. Jardine, concluding with "Auld Lang Syne."

The pickpockets were busy in the crowd, and from Mr. Sydam of South Third street, corner of Fourth, they stole \$2.50. The festival passed off very pleasantly.

THE ASSAULT CASE IN THE CITY COURT.—The Jury in the case of Anna R. McCormick against Alfred O. Backus, being an action for assault under circumstances of an aggravated nature, brought in a sealed verdict yesterday, awarding the plaintiff \$1,250 damages. The plaintiff was a servant in the family of defendant's parents when the assault was committed.

LAYING THE CORNER-STONE OF A NEW CHURCH.—The corner-stone of the Washington-avenue Baptist Church was laid yesterday afternoon, with appropriate ceremonies. The site of the proposed building is on the corner of Washington and Gates avenues, and embraces six lots of ground. The neighborhood is one of the finest in that part of the city, and the edifice promises to be an additional ornament. It is to be of brick, with stone facings, and in the Romanesque style of architecture. The dimensions are to be 30 feet front by 100 feet deep, with a tower 180 feet high, the roof front will be 68 by 80 feet in extent, with 12 columns, supporting a groined ceiling. There will be 196 pews, capable of seating some 300 persons, with a gallery over the vestibule. The style of the pulpit will be plain and modern, with a canopy 40 feet in height. The height of the interior will be 40 feet in the clear. Ample provision is made for heating and ventilation.

A prayer was delivered by the Rev. Mr. Hoag, and addressed by the Rev. Dr. Hague of New York, and the Rev. W. Clark of this city. The box, deposited in the corner stone, contained a history of the church, with the names of the donors and builders of the church, Bible, hymn book, newspapers of the day, &c.

The head workmen are E. L. Roberts, architect; successors of Wm. H. Simonton, deceased, mason; and N. Ray, carpenter; Morgan & Anderson, stone cutters. The building will be ready for occupancy in February of next year. The foundation and timbers of the first floor are already laid. The cost of the lot was \$10,000, and the building \$40,000.

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ACCIDENT TO A FERRY BOAT.—As the Rock Island ferry boat Huguenot was on its way from New York to Erie, it overturned at a wharf near Governor's Island by a sudden squall, which completely stripped the hurricane deck of its awnings and awning-posts, and carried them and the side seats overboard. Fortunately the rain had preceded the accident.
