THE BUTTERFIELD OVERLAND MAIL, with California dates of the 25th ult., arrived at Springfield, Mo., on Thursday evening. The news is of but meager interest. It is now said that Prince Gotoiro, the Japanese Prime Minister, is not dead, and that there is every hope of his recovery.

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THE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS will meet in the morning to determine upon the time of adjournment. Since the action of the Senate on the tariff, they will probably recommend Wednesday, though the day will depend upon the progress of business in the Senate. THE PUBLIC PRINTING. If the joint resolution which the House passed, reducing the cost of printing 40 per cent on existing rates, can be reached in the Senate, there is every probability that it will pass. THE APPROPRIATION BILLS. Both Houses are now engaged on the Appropriation bills, the Senate having up the Army bill, with the non-concurrence of the House in its amendments to the original bill, and the House having before it the Senate amendments to the bill. A COOL PROPOSITION. Mr. Sillidell has the complacency, after voting to postpone the Tariff bill till December, to offer a resolution that a committee be appointed to sit during the recess, with a view of inquiring if a modification be necessary. THE HOUSSAS GRANT. Efforts are making, by the parties interested, to prevent any action by the House on the Senate bill repealing the Houssas grant. The majority and minority reports of the Harper's Ferry Committee were presented to-day, and ordered to be printed. Mr. Mason does not charge that the John Brown raid extended beyond the few persons actually implicated, as was originally alleged, but he endeavors to demonstrate that the teachings of Abolitionists and fanatics have so excited and prejudiced the Northern mind as to extend the responsibility. RELEASE OF MR. HYATT. The Senate have voluntarily released Mr. Hyatt, now that the Committee has concluded its unprofitable mission. THE PACIFIC TELEGRAPH. The House, by a decisive majority, struck out the corporations and privileges which the Senate attached to the Pacific Telegraph bill. THE BALTIMORE CONVENTION. It is understood that Mr. Cushing will issue tickets of admission to the seceders at Charleston in preference to other delegates claiming to be elected since then, which may bring the Convention to a halt at the very start. THE LEADING FRIENDS OF MR. DOUGLASS announce that if the Georgia delegates are admitted at Baltimore they will secede from the Convention, and immediately organize independently. This threat will not attract any support, and may repel it. IF THE CONVENTION should be regularly organized, notwithstanding these obstacles, and both factions agree to proceed to balloting, the Administration will endeavor to concentrate on Breckinridge. His nomination, however, is wholly impracticable, while Kentucky maintains her preference for Guthrie, as expressed at Charleston, without a radical change of opinion, no united nomination need be anticipated. One side or the other must completely surrender to achieve it.
