—Gen. Gillmore reports his loss in the action on Morris Island on the 10th, 11th and 18th of July, at 635 killed and wounded. He estimates the missing at 350, making a total loss of 985.

—It is understood that Gen. Logan will be assigned to the command of the 16th Army Corps, vice Gen. Harburt, resigned.

—The U. S. gunboat Memphis sailed from Hampton Roads on the 29th, for Charleston.

—The steamship Damascus, from Liverpool, July 16, arrived here yesterday. Her news has been anticipated.

—There was a sharp downward turn in the Stock market yesterday morning, with a strong disposition to sell the leading issues. As the call proceeded, however, there was a stronger feeling, and a strong rally took place in the prominent shares.
