Mr. Carroll, have received a revision of the charges preferred, and fully indorse the findings of the church, and the character and standing of its minister in the denomination to which he belongs.

The Burning of St. Joseph's College.

Information has been received here of the burning of St. Joseph's Catholic College, near Monroe, in Susquehanna County. The first took place at a late hour last Friday night after the pupils had retired.

St. Joseph's College, distant about 15 miles from this place, was entirely destroyed on New Year's night. The building was uninsured, and cost about \$25,000.
