

STAVING WOMEN.—This great City of New-York, full of money, full of people, full of luxury, is about the only city in the civilized world where a woman can get anything fit to eat outside of her own house. We have numberless places where men may gorge at any rate from ten cents to ten dollars; where good and sufficient food and attentive waiters (clean, too) are the rule. But the places where women must go, or go hungry, are a shameful disgrace to civilization. The tables are greasy with mopping, or covered with a foul rag not fit to blanket a pet pig; the seats are rickety chairs, or, if heavy and cushioned, are probably full of vermin, inquisitive little creepers who make nasty surveys of your dress and hair; the waiters—who language can do justice to these broad-shouldered, horn-handed, unkempt, eleven animals? Their garments are a mystery of ill-fitting "slops," their linen, if any they have, is foul with dirt and kitchen grease, their faces grimed with sweat and smoke, their hands—ugh!—and then they stick their thumbs (ouch thumbs!) in your soup, paw over your bread, mop down the table with a nasty rag almost as foul as their clothing. Then they are lazy, slow and insulting—full of insolence and stupid to the utmost sense of the term. Such preliminaries for dinner would spoil the appetite of a prisoner just released from Libby. Then as for the food—we spare description; no words can do justice to the mess of food that in most places is palmed off for breakfast or dinner—the pea coffee, dish-water soup, grata-percha, beef, sipping mutton, and soup-grass dessert that make up a bill of fare. For this entertainment a lady is charged fifty per cent more than would suffice for an honest and tolerably clean dinner in places where men alone are the customers.

THE COLORED ORPHAN FAIR.—A number of prominent and enterprising colored ladies of this city have for many years maintained the "Union Bazaar Association," for the purpose of raising funds to support the Colored Orphan Asylum. By their annual fairs they have contributed many thousand dollars to this institution. So generously have their efforts been seconded and supported by some of our wealthy and benevolent citizens in their last fair that over three thousand dollars were taken in a few days. DEPARTURE OF THE TENTH REGIMENT V. R. C.—The 10th Regiment, Veteran Reserve Corps having received, peremptory orders from the War Department to proceed to Washington, departed from their headquarters in Broome street yesterday afternoon for that city in the 6 o'clock train, taking with them every officer and man able to march. All the men of the regiment serving as guard in the Provost Marshal's office and those serving in the harbor went with the regiment, and when the command left they numbered nearly 1,600 men. It is not known whether the 10th Regiment will fight in Washington and vicinity or be ordered to the field, but the former is supposed to be its destination. The staff officers are: Colonel, D. P. Dewitt; Lieutenant-Colonel, Pierre C. Kane; Major, George Bowers; Adjutant, Louis K. M. Brewster; Quartermaster, Louis M. J. Graham.

THE CALL FOR 12,000 MILITIA.—The general officers and commanders of regiments in the 1st Division, N. Y. S. N. G., met again yesterday morning at Gen. Sandford's headquarters, but immediately adjourned without taking any action in the matter of the President's call for 12,000 militia from this State until further orders are received from Albany. The latest dispatch received from Gov. Seymour was to the effect that no regiment should leave this city until they received his orders.

NOT GONE YET.—There has been some excitement among the militia regiments as to which one would be ordered off in response to the President's call for 12,000 men. A newspaper of this city, thinking to make a sensation, and bring the excitement up to fever heat, more especially among the militiamen of the 8th Regiment, N. Y. S. N. G., announced yesterday that this regiment was under marching orders, and that it would be ordered off in response to the President's call, a large number of the members assembled at their Army, corner of Fourth street and Lafayette place, where they found the announcement to be untrue, and the only foundation for it being that Gen. Sandford had notified Col. Conkling to call a meeting of the officers to prepare measures for the departure of the regiment, and it might be called upon at any time. Although the 8th has not yet been ordered off, it is making active preparations for that event. The regiment will in a short time number 1,000 men, as it has commenced recruiting, and now numbers over 600 men.

MR. P. L. ROGERS.—Mr. P. L. Rogers, who has been thirty years in business in this city, met with an accident on the Fourth of July, which resulted in his death on Wednesday afternoon. He was driving along the road to New-Rochelle, when his horse became unmanageable, and he was thrown from his wagon, breaking his collar bone and injuring his head. He was fifty years of age. Funeral services will take place to-day at St. Stephens Church, Twenty-eighth street.
