ATTEMPT TO SUPPRESS FREE SPEECH BY THE DEMOCRATS OF ORANGE, NEW JERSEY.—At a large meeting held in Orange, New Jersey (the home of Gen. Farnsworth bore the interruption in a most praiseworthy manner, and maintained his self-possession and calmness in a most excellent way, and gave the rioters some telling answers, which "brought down the house" in his favor.

FEDERAL OF ALDERMAN McMAHON.—The funeral ceremonies of the late James McMahon, Alderman of the Fifth District, were performed yesterday afternoon at St. James's Roman Catholic Church. At 11 o'clock a procession, headed by the President of the Board of Aldermen, was formed in front of the residence of the deceased, and the remains were borne to the church and placed in the center aisle, near the altar. The interior of the church was draped in mourning. A solemn high mass was then performed by the Rev. James Brennan, pastor, assisted by Deacon O'Callahan, Sub-Deacon O'Hara, of Transfiguration Church, the Rev. E. S. Brady, of St. Teresa's, who acted as Master of Ceremonies; the Rev. Father Curran, of St. Andrew's, and the Rev. Dr. Joyce. After the mass the Rev. Mr. Brennan made a short address, when the remains were removed to the hearse, and the cortege proceeded to Calvary Cemetery where the remains were interred. The inscription on the plate was: "James McMahon, Died Sept. 17, 1864. Aged 35 years." Among the distinguished persons present were the Hon. Fernando Wood, A. O'Leary Hall, esq., and Sheriff Kelly.

REMOVING DIRT, ASHES, ETC., FROM THE CITY.—The offer of Henry Hamilton, for "freighting and removal from without the limits of the city" of all the street dirt, ashes, garbage, and rubbish collected within it, has been accepted. The contract is for three or five years, as may be determined upon by the City Inspector and Comptroller. His conditions are to take all the rubbish from the North River and Roosevelt-street dumps, and pay the city five cents per cart-load, and one cent per cart-load for all the rubbish from the remaining dumps.

GRAT STRAMBOAT SPEED.—The Albany Day Line can boast of having the fastest line of boats in this country, or any other. The old favorite, the Daniel Drew, was often satisfied for his possession of great speed.
