

THE INVESTIGATION AT THE CITY HALL.

Arguments Before Gov. Fenton—The Prosecution Make a Much Stronger Case than was Expected—Brilliant Defense by John Graham for Mr. Boole—Arguments Closed—The Governor Will Decide the Case in a Few Days.

At 11 o'clock yesterday morning the court room was again thronged, the Governor arriving with promptness. Judge Allen asked that the charges against Mr. Devlin be disposed of without a hearing, if, after argument, His Excellency thought he would not be warranted in wasting time by taking further testimony.

Mr. Lawrence said that His Excellency must be convinced that the charges against the Controller were the result of malice, and that it was better for the argument to go on in the regular order. Mr. Waterbury then opened the argument for the prosecution.

JUDGE WATERBURY'S ADDRESS.—Mr. Waterbury said that although the guilt of the officials on trial was fixed in his own mind, it was not even necessary to prove them corrupt, the Governor having power to remove them from office.
