AN ALLEGED ROBBER CAUGHT.—Officer Smith of the Forty-fourth Precinct arrested James Dougherty at an early hour yesterday morning, on the charge of being a robber. FATAL ACCIDENT.—On Saturday, a boy named Corbett, aged 15 years, son of John Corbett, a pilot on the Wall-st. ferry, was run over by one of the Atlantic-ave. cars in Furman-st., and so dreadfully injured that he died of the effects in a few hours thereafter. The parents of the deceased, James Corbett and Mrs. Corbett, are residing at 100 West 12th-st. The driver of the car, was arrested and held to await examination.

BERLARIER.—The residence of Mr. Dale, No. 30 Cranberry-st., was feloniously entered on the morning of the 15th inst., through the back basement window, which had been left unfastened, and a number of articles valued at \$200, in company with a watch, were taken from the premises. AN OLD BRUTE.—Officer Holmes of the Fourth Precinct, arrested a man named Matthew Matlanderger, said to be 30 years of age, on Friday, upon the charge of attempting to violate the person of a blind girl, aged 12 years, named Rose Connelly. As charged, the girl was in company with her mother, who lives at No. 107 West 12th-st. While there Rose went into the apartment of accused with a girl named Bridget Connelly. The latter ran up stairs leaving the blind girl with the old man, who, as alleged, locked the door and attempted to ravish her, in which he was detected by the police, who were summoned to the window to see where the child was. Matlanderger was committed to await examination.

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DESTRUCTION OF A KEROSENE OIL FACTORY BY FIRE.—About 4 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, a fire broke out in the kerosene oil factory of Kinkleb & Rickon, corner of Leonard and Van Pelton-sts., which destroyed a building valued at \$10,000. No insurance. The fire originated by the escape of gas.

SUDDEN DEATH OF A LADY.—Mrs. John Clymer, residing at the corner of Union and Clay-sts., No. 40 West 12th-st., was taken suddenly sick on Saturday evening, and expired on Sunday morning, at her residence, at No. 40 West 12th-st., where she almost immediately expired. Coroner Barrett was notified and held an inquest, when the cause of death was ascertained to be congestion of the lungs.

JUVENILE FORGERS.—Detectives Tilley and Scott of the Third Precinct on Saturday arrested Albert H. Pinkerton and John McGee, aged respectively 16 and 14 years, on three charges of forgery. Young Pinkerton was in the employ of Messrs. Janvier & Van Wyck, at No. 45 Warren-st. On the 23d of June last he forged a check for \$100, in the name of the firm, and it up for the sum of \$25, and appended to it the signatures of the firm. This was presented by him to the paying teller of the National Broadway Bank, and was by that official unobtainable, as he knew the counter to be in the employ of the firm. On July 10, Pinkerton presented a second forged check for \$27, and on July 21 one for \$167 1/2, both of which were likewise cashed. With the money thus procured, the boys, while he led a fast life, drove on the road and into the Park, visits to the theaters and expensive suppers were indulged in without stint. After their arrest Pinkerton confessed everything. Justice Hogan committed the young rascals.

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A CLERK ROBBING HIS EMPLOYER.—Detective Mason, on Saturday, arrested Jacob Banzing, a young German, recently in the employ of H.
