COMMODORE RODGERS AND THE VULCANIC BOMBARDMENT.

Official advices were received to-day by the Government from Commodore Rogers, Commanding the United States Squadron in the Harbor of Valparaiso, to the effect that he, in conjunction with the British Admiral, have protested against the bombardment of that city by the Spanish fleet, and that they have insisted that ample time shall be given for the removal of neutral property, and the women and children, and that if this demand should be refused, they should resist the bombardment with force. The Commodore has the double-turreted monitor Monitor, and five other war ships with him, a force amply sufficient to make him master of the situation.

PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATIONS.

The President to-day nominated to the Senate A. B. Stearns, civilian, to be Collector of the First Internal Revenue District of Pennsylvania, vice Col. J. H. Taggart, a brave soldier of the late war, removed. For county, Gen. Samuel F. Carey, the temperance lecturer, has been appointed Collector of the Second Ohio District, vice R. M. S. Taylor, removed. Mr. Taylor was supported by the Ohio delegation; Gen. Carey by his brother-in-law, Stowell, of the Executive Committee of the Washington Johnson Club. Josiah P. Heinrich is appointed to be Collector of the Eleventh Internal Revenue District of Pennsylvania; R. Clark to be Assessor of Internal Revenue in the Thirteenth District of Pennsylvania, and Samuel McKelvy to be United States Marshal for the Western District of Pennsylvania, vice Alexander Murdoch, removed.

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perish from starvation without Government aid between thirty and forty thousand persons; and it is probably true that nearly this number are subsisting upon a very scanty supply of the coarsest and poorest quality of food. During the quarter, the number of patients issued were as exhibited in the following statement: January, 47,836 rations were issued to refugees, and 11,696 to freedmen; February, 54,023 rations to refugees, and 9,817 rations to freedmen; March, 102,243 rations to refugees, and 11,442 rations to freedmen. Beside the rations, large quantities of clothing have been distributed.

GEN. SICKLES MINISTER TO THE HAGUE. The name of Gen. Daniel E. Sickles was sent to the Senate to-day as Minister to the Hague.

MEETING OF THE RECONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE. The Reconstruction Committee met this morning as per agreement, but, without coming to any definite conclusion, adjourned to meet at 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning. The opinion is expressed that a partial report will be agreed upon at that meeting.

PRIZE PAYMENTS. Payments on the lists of the prize fund, captured by the United States steamer St. Lawrence, and of the prize Josephine, captured by the United States steamer Hatteras, have already commenced, and certificates will be ready to issue to claimants in about two weeks.

REPORT ON THE PACIFIC ROAD. The Pacific Railroad Committee have prepared their report, guaranteeing Government aid to the Northern Pacific route, and will submit the same to a session of the House to-morrow evening, specially convened for that purpose by vote to-day. The friends of the measure are very sanguine of its final adoption.

MITRO-GLYCERINE. It will be remembered that after the surrender of Gen. Lee the military stores captured at Appomattox, which included the Exchange and the Bank of Virginia at Richmond. Recent investigations of the facts, however, show that a large stock before the evacuation of Richmond, the Legislature of Virginia passed a law authorizing the said banks to loan the Confederate Government, upon the faith of the \$300,000 of gold to purchase supplies for Lee's army. This sum was loaned to the Confederate Government, and before the surrender of Lee \$60,000 was paid, leaving \$240,000 belonging to the Federal Government with these banks at the time of the evacuation. The Government has since then received only the \$100,000 captured in Georgia, but also the \$140,000 additional in custody of the banks. This is the present condition of the question. The notes of these banks have been bought up with the expectation that the Government would reimburse its title to the \$240,000 of gold.

THE TEST OATH. The report of Representative Wilson (Iowa) to-day, from the Committee on the Judiciary, on the message of the President of the United States, transmitting communications from the Secretary of the Treasury and Postmaster-General, suggesting a modification of the oath of office prescribed by the act of Congress approved July 2, 1862, contains the following points:

The resolution was passed when the nation was in the midst of a gigantic war, waged against it by its own citizens, and Congress intended to establish it as a permanent part of public policy, which should be applied to all who held office in the Government, and who had voluntarily abandoned its allegiance to the Government, and joined in the rebellion against it. CONFIRMATIONS. The Senate, in Executive session to-day, confirmed the following nominations: Dennis G. Cooley, of Iowa, to be United States Marshal for the Eastern District of Missouri; Leopold R. Roster, of Wisconsin, to be Consul at Stettin.

REVENUE FRAUDS. Mr. HIGBY offered a resolution instructing the Committee on Public Expenditures to investigate the compliance with the law in respect to the collection of duties in connection with the Custom House at Boston, and to ascertain what disposition has been made of the moneys paid on such compliance; also to investigate such other matters as may be referred to the Committee.

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It was no right to complain of persons who were forced to give aid to the rebellion, and who were not to be held responsible therefor. This test oath must at some time, and that not far distant, be repealed. It cannot always remain, unless it is determined to keep the Government in a state of partiality to the South of the value in the affairs of the nation. That cannot be done and this country remain a republic. The President, therefore, should be authorized to suspend the test oath, and to exclude seven millions from participating in Federal affairs by the obligation to take an oath foreign to the Constitution, and they should take without fear any other oath, pure and simple.

AFTER FURTHER ARGUMENT THE REPORT CONCLUDES, AS FOLLOWS: "View of all the surrounding circumstances it does appear that we should lay our party prejudices aside, elevate our eyes to the situation of affairs, and modify the test, so far as it is recommended by the Honorable Secretary of the Treasury and the Honorable Postmaster-General of the United States. It is to be hoped that our revenues will be collected, and our means of communication through the Post-Office maintained, and all over the vast domain of our common country, without the necessity of using such measures as will tend to alienate the affections of our people, and to excite a disposition to rebel against our Government. For the reasons herein set forth, it is recommended that Congress do modify the test oath, and that it be read as follows: 'That I have not voluntarily sought any office whatever under any authority or pretended authority in hostility to the United States.'

DISPOSAL OF PUBLIC PROPERTY. The President has approved the bill authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to lease or convey to any person, such lands, buildings, and other property, as he may deem advisable, provided the lands are in Cleveland, Ohio, and Portland, Maine, shall be sold, or leased, or otherwise disposed of, in a reasonable manner, and for the benefit of the public.

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
