Spain refuses to give England satisfaction in the case of the Tornado. The question now is whether England will take satisfaction. No one doubts its power to do so.

The war party is said to be again in the ascendency at Constantinople, and the Government of the Sultan, accordingly, threatens to declare war against Greece.

New-Jersey has resolved to keep its white franchise degraded by refusing to allow colored men to vote. A motion to strike from the Constitution of the State the word white failed in its House yesterday by a vote of 29 to 35.

The Legislature of Wisconsin has passed the bill granting suffrage to the women of the State. At the same time New-Jersey has declined the franchise to its colored people.

The State Conventions held at Syracuse and Albany yesterday have made their nominations, and we present the names of the 52 gentlemen who will be elected delegates at large to the Constitutional Convention.

The Judicial Districts named two delegates, of which one delegate was selected by the Convention, and the remaining eight were then chosen by general vote.

The Democratic Convention elected the Hon. D. A. Ogden, Chairman, and listened to speeches from that gentleman and Mr. Samuel J. Tilden, of which the burden was the wrongs of the South.

On the Republican ticket some names are omitted which should have been inserted, but it need not fear comparison with that adopted at Albany.

The ticket which Mr. Mills-pugh proposed to substitute for the nominees of the Committee was considerably stronger than the one which the Democrats actually adopted.

The iniquitous project to extend Church-st. from Fulton-st. to Morris-st., was yesterday opposed by a meeting of property holders, whose proceedings we print.

The amount of damage which it is estimated will be done to those whose property is to be wrested from them, under the form of law, is about \$2,700,000.
