But the matters that it refers to have some time ago passed into history, and it will not probably be difficult to ascertain the facts from a very different point of view.

"Over the Middle Atlantic States" \* light rains, followed by clearing weather by Thursday night.

THE PRESIDENT'S VICTORY.

Gen. Grant has vanquished the people of Louisiana again. He has telegraphed to his generals and his admirals; he has set the army and navy in motion; and the lawful Government of Louisiana surrenders.
If there was any doubt before as to the character of the usurpation which rules the unhappy State by favor of the President—any question whether the people really acquiesced in it—there can be none now.

COITON PROSPECTS.

The cotton crop for the year ending the 1st inst. is 4,170,000 bales, which has been exceeded only three times in the history of cotton culture in this country.
This large crop follows the large crop of 1872-3, which was 3,930,000 bales. The natural result is that manufacturers are now provided with larger stocks than usual and that prices are tending downward.

SYRACUSE.

It has not been a very friendly gathering at Syracuse. The bad blood which inflamed the party before the Convention assembled grew hotter and hotter as the proceedings went on.
The meeting trembled for two days on the verge of a row and broke up in bitterness and vexation of spirit, its closing hours being distinguished by a preposterous resolution, introduced by Mr. Jarvis Lord, to censure the principal organ of the party for urging the very action which the Convention finally adopted.

His ability has made him the recognized leader of his party in this State, and if he should be elected his career in office would be distinguished alike by integrity, decorum, administrative skill, and shrewd political management.

After much poverty and endurance the family move to Washington, and the thwarted female becomes an expert lobbyist—meets her married lover, and one morning blows his brains out, remarking as she does it, "I'm a Republican."
